## TO WALK BY FAITH IN CHRIST (THE DESIRE OF EVERY TRUE CHRISTIAN) The First Century Gospel Church/Philadelphia

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The life of every true Christian should be inspired by an inward <u>thirst</u> to learn from God all about His Word, so it can be understood and applied in every part of one's life. <u>When</u> one's thirst for God's Truth is coupled by a sincere inward desire of the heart to <u>want</u> to follow God's Word, then we have opened the door for the <u>Holy Spirit</u> of God to come into our life. God's Spirit can help us to walk <u>by faith</u> to live an <u>overcoming</u> Christian life of faith each day and to <u>receive</u> <u>spiritual</u> <u>blessing</u> along with each victory received by faith on God. Jesus told those who thirst to overcome in faith, those who <u>overcome</u> are fit for His Kingdom (Rev.21:6) "And He said to me, "It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End. I will give of the fountain of the <u>water of life'</u> freely to him who <u>thirsts</u>."

God freely gives the Holy Spirit to those who thirst to know <u>His</u> <u>Truth.</u> He will enable them to <u>understand</u> so that they can <u>believe</u> and <u>follow</u> in overcoming faith to receive <u>all</u> things from Him. (Vs.7) promises overcomers in the faith, that they will <u>also inherit</u> all things <u>in Eternity</u>, "He who overcomes <u>shall</u> <u>inherit all</u> things, and I <u>will be his God</u> and he shall <u>be My son</u>." (That's quite a promise from God for anyone <u>willing</u> to put God's Will first and endure in faith to the end of their life). (Rev.2:10) "Be faithful to the End, even if you have to die, and then I will give you the victor's Wreath of Life."

Simply stated, Overcoming means a complete faith and trust on God for everything and in every circumstance in our life (and whatever we receive in <u>God's will</u> and in <u>His way always</u> carries a <u>spiritual</u> <u>blessing</u>). That enables us to have better knowledge of <u>God's</u> <u>greatness</u>, and so, a <u>willingness</u> to <u>be</u> an overcomer <u>through obedient</u> <u>faith</u> on His power, (and on the power of the Atonement Blood sacrifice His Son made on a Cross to cleanse, pardon, and redeem our life <u>from</u> <u>sin's penalty</u>. Jesus' Blood sacrifice is the <u>only merit</u> we have to <u>make our claims</u> for fulfillment of God's Promises and enables us to be an overcomer through obedient faith in this life and to receive His <u>promised inheritance</u> of "all things" in <u>Eternity</u>. Jesus promised us (Rev.2:26) "And to him who <u>overcomes and obeys My commands</u> to the <u>very</u> <u>end</u>, ... I will <u>give authority over the nations</u> of the earth."

A <u>thirst</u> to <u>know</u> God's <u>Word;</u> a <u>heart</u> that is <u>willing</u> to <u>be</u> <u>corrected</u> by <u>God's Spirit;</u> and to be <u>willing</u> to be <u>led</u> by Him to <u>follow His Word;</u> <u>that</u> <u>is</u> all that God is looking for in every person. God is waiting for us to come to Him in faith, <u>instead of trusting on</u> <u>our own efforts of a self-life</u>.

God just wants to see <u>willingness</u> in our heart to <u>draw near</u> to <u>Him</u> in faith and allow Him to direct our path. He instructed <u>us</u> (James 4:8) "Draw near to God, and He will draw near to you. <u>Cleanse</u> your hands, you sinners, and make your hearts pure, you who are half-hearted toward God."

When it is our desire to draw near to God; <u>be</u> <u>corrected</u> <u>by</u> His <u>Spirit</u>; and be <u>cleansed</u> by Jesus' Blood through our faith, that opens the door for the <u>Holy Spirit</u> to <u>enter</u> <u>our life</u> and to direct us on the narrow pathway that Jesus <u>told</u> <u>us</u> we <u>must</u> <u>follow</u> to enter His Kingdom. (Luke 13:24) "Strain every nerve to force your way in <u>through</u> the <u>narrow gate</u>," (meaning, to <u>be sincere in our commitment</u> to trust in obedient <u>faith</u> <u>on</u> <u>God's</u> <u>power</u>, and <u>He</u> will <u>keep</u> <u>us</u> <u>on</u> that <u>narrow</u> <u>path</u>), "for multitudes, I tell you, will endeavor to find a way in and <u>will not</u> <u>succeed</u>." Jesus <u>referred</u> to those whose <u>trust</u> is <u>on</u> <u>their</u> <u>outward</u> <u>religious</u> <u>efforts</u> <u>of</u> a <u>self-life</u> to try to find a way in to His Kingdom (<u>other</u> than by that <u>narrow</u> <u>gate</u> <u>of</u> <u>faith</u>, by which Jesus said that we must "strain every nerve to force our way in (while at the same time they <u>ignore</u> why Jesus died on the Cross, so that they can <u>believe</u> <u>on</u> the power <u>of</u> <u>His</u> <u>Atonement</u> <u>sacrifice</u>), and receive His Holy Spirit,.. Who will lead them through that narrow gate.

Jesus <u>encourages</u> everyone (John 3:18), "He who <u>trusts</u> <u>in</u> <u>Him</u> does <u>not come up for judgement</u>." (and then <u>reminds</u> us) "He who <u>does</u> <u>not trust</u> has already received sentence, because he has <u>not</u> his <u>trust</u> <u>resting</u> on the <u>Name</u> of God's only Son." For a person not to come up for judgement <u>because they trust on God's only Son</u>, clearly <u>emphasizes</u> for all of us just how <u>important</u> a life of <u>total faith</u> and <u>trust on</u> <u>God</u> really <u>is</u>.

Jesus was <u>not</u> contradictory when He said to strain every nerve to force your way in <u>because</u> He <u>was not telling us</u> to do things in our own strength, <u>rather</u>, He is saying, strain every nerve to follow the narrow path of <u>faith</u> and <u>trust</u> that He, Himself set for us to follow. He told us (Luke 9:58) "but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay His head." (In other words), I have <u>no human place of trust</u> to <u>depend</u> on, but <u>by faith</u> God supplied every daily need for Him, (and He will do the same for us today.)

Jesus said to another disciple(vs.59) "Follow <u>me</u>." He meant to <u>stop trusting</u> on <u>efforts</u> and manipulations <u>of self or</u> letting needs be known to others to try to get what you need in life. Jesus <u>meant</u>, <u>`think about the example of trust</u> that I am setting for you to follow.'

<u>After</u> Jesus' Atonement sacrifice for us and His resurrection to Life, He <u>could have said</u> think about all that I have already done for you (even when you were <u>still</u> a <u>sinner</u>). He did say, however, (John 20;27) "Do <u>not</u> be <u>ready</u> to <u>disbelieve</u>, but to <u>believe</u>."

That's the same message <u>Peter</u> gave to Cornelius <u>and</u> his <u>household</u>; that is they were <u>not</u> to <u>depend</u> <u>on</u> their own efforts but <u>just believe on</u> what Jesus had already done to <u>forgive</u> them <u>of</u> their <u>sins of unbelief</u> (and then to act in faith on His <u>Name</u> and the power of His atoning sacrifice). (Acts 10:43) "To Him <u>all</u> the <u>Prophets bear</u> <u>witness</u>, and <u>testify</u> that <u>through</u> <u>His</u> <u>Name</u> all who <u>believe</u> <u>in</u> <u>Him</u> receive the <u>forgiveness</u> of their sins." (meaning, <u>only</u> those who believe on Jesus' Name, will 'receive the forgiveness of their sins'.) (Acts 10:2) tells us that Cornelius was religious and God-fearing and so was every member of his household. So, (<u>in essence</u>), Peter <u>was</u> <u>saying</u>, you <u>still lack something spiritually</u>. Don't think that because you are religious and God-fearing (your <u>outward acts of</u> <u>righteousness</u>, he meant), that it will get you to heaven. You have to <u>believe</u> in Christ, be <u>trusting</u> in His Father <u>through Him and in His</u> Name (just like the Son of God did as an example for each one of us).

For that reason, it is <u>so important</u> for us to <u>understand</u> what it <u>means</u> to truly <u>be</u> a <u>believer</u> in <u>Christ</u> and <u>on the power</u> of His Blood. Just <u>saying</u> Lord, Lord, but <u>not doing</u> <u>God's will</u>, (<u>is</u> the way most <u>professed believers live their lives</u>). But Jesus <u>spoke</u> very <u>clearly</u> on that issue of <u>unbelief</u>. "Not everyone who says to me, <u>Master</u>, <u>Master</u>,' will enter the Kingdom of the Heavens, but <u>only those</u> who are <u>obedient</u> to my Father who is in Heaven."

(Vs 22) "<u>Many</u> will <u>say to Me</u> in <u>that day</u>, `Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?' "And then I will declare to them `I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice <u>lawlessness</u>!"

Jesus referred to their <u>unbelief</u> and <u>disobedience</u> to His Word as lawlessness <u>because</u> it is putting one's place of trust on someone or thing, <u>instead of doing the will of God</u>, by <u>trusting on Him</u>. "I never knew you; <u>depart</u> from Me", he said. [ Do <u>we</u> want to keep company <u>with</u> and be <u>influenced</u> by people whom Jesus never knew because they <u>did not</u> <u>trust on Him</u> and power of His Atonement Blood? Certainly not!!]

Apostle Paul explained that <u>unbelief</u> is <u>idolatry</u> (a <u>wrong place</u> of <u>trust</u>), and that we should not keep close fellowship with those whose place of trust is on other things instead of on God. (2 Cor.6:14 -16) "Do not be unequally yoked together with <u>unbelievers</u>. For what fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what communion has light with darkness? And what accord has Christ with Belial? Or what part has a believer with an unbeliever? And what agreement has the temple of God with idols? For you are the temple of the <u>living God</u>."

Jesus said, "<u>Trust</u> in God: trust in <u>Me</u> <u>also</u>." (John 14:1)."<u>Follow</u> <u>Me</u>" He said. (vs.6) "No one comes to the Father, <u>except</u> <u>through</u> Me."

That is what Jesus told the wealthy young ruler (Matt.19:) who had said that he <u>carefully kept</u> all the commandments after Jesus had explained (Vs.17) that was what <u>he must do if he</u> desired to <u>enter</u> into <u>Life</u>. "What do I still lack?" the man <u>asked</u>. Jesus replied (vs.21), "if you desire to be perfect", (there is still one thing <u>wanting</u> in you) "go and sell all that you have, and give to the poor, and you shall have wealth in Heaven; <u>and come</u>, <u>follow</u> me." Jesus meant, it is <u>good</u> that you have kept the commandments (as you <u>must do</u>), but you have to trust Me financially. (Jesus <u>did not separate</u> faith and obedience, nor is it separated anywhere else in the Bible). Get rid of those things <u>you are depending on</u> instead of trusting my Heavenly Father, <u>then...</u> come follow Me. The man went away sad because he didn't want to <u>give up</u> the <u>things</u> he was <u>depending</u> on. He <u>was not</u> ready to follow Christ. It is apparent from this example that the devil had the young man convinced he <u>could not live</u> an <u>overcoming</u> life of faith and trust in God. However, Jesus was not asking him (and God is not asking us) to do that in our own strength (and our knowledge). <u>God promised</u> that His Holy Spirit would <u>guide</u> us into all Truth (John 16:13), along the narrow path to Heaven in an overcoming life of faith and trust (which He would have done for that young man if he would give up human trust.

By God's grace we <u>can't let</u> the devil deceive <u>us</u> with discouragement. We <u>have to come through every trial</u> or <u>loss</u> (by the <u>grace</u> of <u>God</u> and <u>inspiration</u> of His Spirit), with a <u>stronger</u> faith than we had <u>before</u> the temptation or trial. We <u>must continue</u> to <u>have</u> (and show) a thirst <u>for</u> <u>His</u> <u>Word</u>, and a willingness to follow the Savior's <u>example</u> of trust in His Father. Again, we know that Jesus <u>promised</u> (Rev.21:6-7), saying, "To <u>those</u> who are <u>thirsty</u> I will give the <u>privilege</u> of drinking from the well of the Water of Life(the Holy Spirit) <u>without</u> <u>payment</u>. All this shall be the <u>heritage</u> of him who <u>overcomes</u>, and I will <u>be</u> <u>his</u> <u>God</u> and he shall be one of <u>My</u> sons."

The writer to the Hebrews told us (Heb. 10:22) "Let us draw near with <u>sincerity</u> and <u>unfaltering faith</u>, having had our hearts sprinkled <u>once for all</u>, from <u>consciences</u> oppressed with <u>sin</u> and our bodies bathed in pure water." <u>When we</u> draw near to God in faith, we <u>open the</u> <u>way</u> for God to fulfill His promise, to <u>send His</u> <u>Spirit</u>, and <u>guide</u> us in living an <u>overcoming</u> 'Christian life'.

To <u>be</u> an overcomer in the Christian life, is something we <u>must</u> all <u>strive</u> to <u>accomplish</u> in our life on earth ("strain every nerve to <u>force</u> your way in" Jesus said). That is, <u>to live</u> a <u>life</u> of faith and trust in God for everything we need in our life, and <u>for God to be in</u> <u>control</u> of everything that touches our life. Everything has to pass through Him <u>before</u> it touches us <u>when we place</u> <u>ourselves</u> in real <u>faith</u> under the Atonement blood of His Son, and our <u>desire</u> is to <u>do His</u> Will. (John 15:10)"<u>If</u> you <u>obey</u> my commands, you <u>will</u> <u>continue</u> in My love, as I have <u>obeyed My Father's</u> <u>commands</u> and <u>continue</u> in His love."

Each of Jesus' seven letters to the Churches of Asia, emphasized the <u>importance</u> of living an <u>overcoming</u> Christian life. (Also made note of the <u>results</u>), (Rev. chapters 2-3 say) "<u>He</u> who <u>overcomes</u>, (or) to him <u>who</u> overcomes", Jesus said, "I will <u>give</u> the <u>fruit</u> of the Tree of Life, the hidden Manna, and shall be clothed in white garments. I <u>will</u> <u>make him</u> a pillar in the sanctuary of my God, or the <u>privilege</u> of sitting down with Me on My throne". And (Rev.2:26), "to <u>him</u> <u>who</u> <u>overcomes</u> and <u>obeys</u> My commands to the <u>very end</u>, I will give authority over nations of the earth."

We want to <u>heed</u> that advice <u>to</u> draw near with <u>sincerity</u> and unfaltering <u>faith</u> by <u>trusting</u> on <u>God</u> in every circumstance we face, and for every <u>need</u> or <u>want</u> in our life. (That is, for <u>God</u>'s promised <u>peace within</u> ourselves, for Him to comfort (and <u>keep us in comfort</u>), also for His <u>protection</u> <u>over</u> us, and for Him to provide our <u>needs</u> as well as other scriptural requests we may have. <u>Most</u> importantly, <u>for</u> the presence of His <u>Spirit</u> within ourselves, to <u>protect</u> us <u>from</u> being <u>deceived</u> by <u>Satan</u> to place our dependence on something <u>else</u> besides <u>God</u> or not have a <u>forgiving heart</u> when we are wronged as Jesus said that we <u>must have</u> if we want forgiveness for ourselves. (Matt.6:14-15).

We <u>prepare</u> for Eternal Life with Jesus through <u>the application</u> of <u>His Word in our life</u>, that <u>is</u> to have <u>complete</u> <u>faith</u> in <u>His promises</u>. <u>That is how</u> our <u>faith</u> grows and is <u>perfected</u> as we come to know God

<u>better</u> than we did before. Each temptation or trial that God brings us through in our life of <u>faith</u> and <u>trust</u> carries with it a blessing of <u>spiritual</u> <u>advancement</u> in our life. <u>Believing</u> in God and <u>acting</u> in real faith in Him, is counted unto us as righteousness. (James 2:22-23 explains)" <u>You see that his faith and his actions</u> were <u>working</u> <u>together</u>, and his <u>faith</u> was <u>made</u> <u>complete</u> by what he did. And the <u>Scripture</u> was <u>fulfilled</u> that <u>says</u>, " Abraham <u>believed</u> <u>God</u>, and it <u>was</u> <u>credited</u> to him as <u>righteousness</u>," (and, he <u>was called</u> 'God's <u>friend'</u>.)

Abraham <u>advanced</u> (or <u>grew</u>) <u>spiritually</u> through <u>believing</u> God's <u>Word to him</u> (as <u>we all must grow</u> spiritually. Abraham <u>had</u> to advance because God <u>allowed further tests</u> to be <u>met right</u> in his life (and to <u>perfect his faith</u>). Because of God's dealing with him (and resulting spiritual growth from <u>each situation met</u> by <u>trusting God</u>), he <u>was</u> <u>enabled</u> at age one hundred to <u>believe</u> God for the birth of his son Isaac. He was also enabled to trust God <u>for protection of</u> his nephew <u>Lot</u> and family (when God destroyed the towns of Sodom and Gomorrah).

Abraham's final test came when he was told by God to sacrifice his son on Mount Moriah. But God <u>delivered</u> him from that harrowing test of his faith when He saw that Abraham was <u>sincere</u> in faithful obedience, and He preserved the life of Abraham's son <u>Isaac</u> (through whom the Israelites descended).

Abraham drew near to God with <u>sincerity</u> and <u>unfaltering faith</u>, (as we are told to do Heb.10:22). His <u>heart was</u> sprinkled once for all, <u>from a conscience</u> oppressed with sin, as <u>we</u> are told we are to have that <u>accomplished</u> in <u>our</u> life. (Matt.5:48) Jesus said, "You however are to be <u>complete</u> in <u>goodness</u> as your <u>Heavenly</u> Father is complete."

<u>As we advance</u> in the <u>faith</u> and come to <u>know</u> God better than we did before, this (in turn) enables <u>us to be more prepared</u> for that <u>`next test'</u>. God is no respecter of persons, and He <u>will allow</u> each one <u>of us to be tested</u> to prove our <u>faithfulness</u> to His <u>Word</u>.

We <u>don't have to fear</u> 'tests of our faith' that God will <u>allow</u>, any more <u>than Abraham did</u>. God <u>allows the tests</u> to <u>perfect our</u> <u>spiritual growth</u>, and our advancement in the true Christian life because He loves us, and He wants to save us from our sins.

(1 Cor.10:13) "No temptation has you in its power, but such as is common to human nature; and God is faithful and will <u>not allow</u> you to be tempted beyond your strength. But, when temptation comes, He will also provide the way of escape; so that you may be able to bear it."

When Israel was tempted by <u>false prophets</u> (who rose up <u>from</u> <u>among</u> them), <u>Moses was inspired</u> by <u>God</u> to <u>tell</u> <u>them</u> (Deut.13:3)"The LORD

your <u>God is testing you</u>, to <u>find out whether you love him with all</u> your <u>heart</u>, and with <u>all your soul</u>."

The <u>New</u> Testament also tells us <u>that God allows us to be tested</u> to <u>see if we</u> truly <u>love</u> and <u>trust Him</u> with <u>our heart</u> and <u>soul</u>, and to <u>see (prove)</u> if we are depending on something or someone else. (Hebr.2:5-6) "You have quite <u>forgotten</u> the <u>encouraging</u> words which are addressed to <u>you</u> as <u>sons</u>, and which say, "My son, do not think lightly of the Lord's discipline, and <u>do not faint when He corrects</u> you; for those whom the Lord <u>loves</u> He <u>disciplines</u>: <u>and</u> He scourges every son whom He acknowledges."

Then (Hebr.10: <u>explains</u>) that it is <u>the surrender of our will</u> that <u>God wants to take place in our heart</u>. <u>Jesus' example</u> of <u>obedience</u> to <u>His</u> Father's will (Vs.7), "Then I said, `I have come-in the roll of the book it is written concerning Me: to <u>do</u> <u>Thy</u> <u>will</u>, O God.'"

<u>God</u> will <u>see to it</u>, that we have <u>many</u> <u>opportunities</u> to <u>prove</u> for <u>ourselves</u> <u>those</u> sacred writings (as apostle Paul said), in our own life experiences. We <u>will have the choice</u> to trust <u>in Him</u> (or to <u>not</u> <u>trust in Him</u>). God <u>will teach us how</u> to <u>use the Promises</u> He gave us, in <u>our life of faith and trust in Him and His Son, and, <u>how to</u> <u>claim/receive</u> our <u>`Atonement rights'</u> in <u>Christ</u>.</u>

A true <u>Christian's</u> desire is; ... to `walk by faith in Christ'. &&&&&&

SOME MAIN POINTS OF... "To Walk by Faith"/ THE CHRISTIAN'S DESIRE... 1./ And the message theme is, that a <u>sincere</u> <u>thirst</u> to <u>know</u> His Word, and a <u>willingness</u> to apply it in our life, is the <u>recipe</u> that <u>allows</u> the <u>Holy Spirit</u> to come into our heart and <u>enable</u> <u>us</u> to <u>be</u> <u>an</u> <u>over-</u> <u>comer</u> in the <u>true</u> Christian '<u>life of faith'</u>.

2./ Having a <u>thirst</u> to know and understand <u>God's Word</u> (the <u>Bible</u>), and <u>willingness</u> to <u>follow</u> His Word that leads to God's Kingdom <u>will allow</u> <u>the Holy Spirit</u> to inspire <u>desire</u> for a believer to <u>always</u> <u>do</u> God's Will, (and as Jesus said), "strain every nerve to force your way in". 3./ The <u>example</u> is given, of Abraham, who <u>passed</u> the <u>tests</u> of <u>his</u> <u>faith</u> (as he faithfully obeyed God's words), thus, he drew near to God with sincerity and unfaltering faith (as <u>we</u> are told to <u>do</u> (Hebr.10: 22). <u>Abraham became</u> an <u>overcomer</u> in the faith, and, God even promised to <u>bless</u> <u>his</u> <u>descendants</u>, forever. <u>&&&&&</u>

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
