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For a <u>Christian</u> to <u>realize</u> the <u>value</u> of <u>liv-</u> ing <u>up to</u> our '<u>calling</u>' by God to <u>be</u> <u>conformed</u> to the image of His Son, Jesus Christ (in <u>our own</u> life), is of <u>utmost importance</u> for a Christian (and there <u>is no more valuable</u> 'calling').

It is a <u>necessary transformation to take</u> <u>place in the heart of every true Christian</u>. It is in reality, <u>giving our life back to God</u>, so that <u>He can free us from the bondage caused by the</u> <u>sin of Adam</u> (which is 'going <u>our own way without God'</u>).

That transformation can <u>only</u> be <u>accomplished</u> by God's <u>grace</u> and <u>power</u>, after <u>we</u> have made a sincere <u>commitment</u> in <u>our life</u> to become <u>reunited to Christ</u>. <u>God</u> will then use situations in our life to bring about the needed drastic change (from our human nature to a new divine nature).

He will use every circumstance small or large that touches us, to conform us into the <u>image</u> of <u>Jesus Christ</u>. (Because that is His calling for us, and even more-so after being baptized and committing our life back to God.) It is worth all the trials and tests that we go through, however, for us to be victorious in our own personal life of <u>overcoming faith</u>, <u>because</u> it has <u>eternal rewards</u>.

God will use the things that people <u>say</u> and <u>do toward us</u> to develop a Christlike character <u>within our heart</u>. Many times, that will take place in our own home, where Satan always tries to bring about differences, and to cause hard feelings toward other family members. Similar <u>situations</u> may also take place in our neighborhood, at our workplace, when in a grocery or department <u>store</u> (or any place where there are other people to deal with). There will always be people who will say and do things antagonistic, because of Satan's influence over them.

However, the <u>way</u> <u>we</u> meet those disagreements and circumstances will be a huge factor in <u>our spiritual growth</u>, and that most necessary developing of a <u>Christlike</u> <u>character</u> <u>within</u> our <u>heart</u>.

If we were to meet those differences via anxious worry, hostility, and resentment, or returning evil for evil. (instead of meeting wrongs with divine love),.. we would grow into the image of Satan instead of the image of Jesus Christ.

In most <u>all instances</u> it is '<u>PRIDE'</u> within <u>ourselves</u> that would make us speak out in anger (and to <u>react wrongly</u> toward each other). We must pray daily for <u>God</u> to <u>take</u> that <u>pride</u> from our <u>heart</u>, for it is He alone who can do that, but <u>we</u> must be <u>willing</u> to give God that <u>oppor-</u> <u>tunity</u>.(Luke 13:34)"How often I wanted to gather your children together" "but <u>you</u> were <u>not</u> <u>will-</u> ing!"(Jesus said).

God is always looking to <u>see</u> a <u>willing</u> <u>heart</u> within a person, and He will quickly take control of them and give them the <u>spiritual grace</u> and <u>guidance</u> needed to trust Him in an overcoming life of faith.

God's Word tells us that "<u>all things</u> work together <u>for good</u> to them that love Him (Rom. 8:28). So, if we meet things right, He will use all those circumstances to <u>conform us</u> to the 'image of Christ'.

God's Word says, <u>'All things'</u>, so that means <u>everything</u> that touches us, so if we trust God to help us meet those 'differences' and wrong treatment as the <u>Bible</u> teaches, meeting them <u>without resentment</u>, (<u>but</u> with genuine <u>love</u>), also by returning <u>good</u> for evil, and keeping silent when wronged <u>(instead of lashing out</u> at the other person as the world would do).

Then we will become more Christlike through <u>God's</u> workmanship. God will enable us to <u>act and react</u> the way that <u>Jesus</u> would act and respond when <u>we</u> are <u>willing</u> to act <u>humbly</u> as He would.

(1 Pet. 2:19-22) "For it is an acceptable thing with God, if, from a sense of duty to Him, a man patiently <u>submits</u> to wrong, when treated unjustly. If you do wrong and receive a blow for it, what credit is there in your bearing it patiently? But if when you do right and suffer for it you bear it patiently, this is an acceptable thing with God. And it is to this you were <u>called</u>; because Christ also suffered on your behalf, leaving you an <u>example</u> so that you should follow in His steps."

(<u>That</u> is some example for us to imitate, and by a full surrender on our part, God can help us by His grace and guidance, to <u>live up to His</u> 'high <u>calling'</u> for us.)

Those verses of Scripture from God, make it very <u>plain to us</u> that battles we get into(and <u>how we meet them</u>) is a <u>big factor</u> in our being conformed to the <u>likeness of Christ</u>, because it says, *"Christ also suffered on your behalf, leaving you an <u>example</u> so that <u>you</u> <u>should follow in His steps</u>."*

That does not mean battles that are long drawn out and lost, because the blessing received comes with '<u>the victory</u>' in the battle (<u>not from</u> the battle itself).

After a person has passed through a severe temptation, whether physical, spiritual, in our home-life, financially or otherwise, and we get your victory in God's way, we will find that we <u>have developed spiritually</u>, and that there is <u>less influence of</u> the old <u>self-life</u> about us.

Also, we will now have a greater influence and power of the Christ-life within. Therefore, we really "ought to value very highly" the <u>things</u> and <u>circumstances</u> that we need to meet. (Hebr.12:5) tells us we <u>are not to</u> '<u>despise</u> the chastening of the Lord', which <u>means</u> that we should not regard it lightly. Rather, we are to count it as a <u>very valuable part</u> of the <u>Christ-life</u> because God uses every circum-stance in our life to teach us how He wants us to live our life.

Many people will become frightened when faced with a financial battle. If their wages are lowered, or they are laid off from work for a while, they get worried, upset, and anxious.

If, however, we have given our life back to God for Him to control things for us, then nothing could happen (not even a small thing like losing your income for a period of time), that it would not be for our highest good and best interest spiritually. Also, be a steppingstone toward our being made over into the image of Christ. It may <u>not</u> have always <u>seemed</u> to be that way (<u>when we</u> had to meet those situations), but the <u>wonderful</u> value of the <u>temptation</u>, the rich results <u>we received</u> by <u>meeting it according to</u> <u>God's plan</u>, with <u>added</u> spiritual light, strength, and new knowledge of God, along with the death of 'self' and the development of the Christlife in us, are far beyond any earthly value.

The apostle Paul referred to temptations that <u>he had to pass through</u>, as if being 'small hardships', and he described them in this way, (2 Cor.4:17-18) "For our <u>light affliction</u>, which is <u>but for a moment</u>, is working for us a far more <u>exceeding and eternal weight of glory</u>, while we <u>do not look at the things which are seen</u>, but at the things which are not seen. For the things which are <u>seen</u> are <u>temporary</u>, but the things which are <u>not seen</u> are <u>eternal</u>."

At first in our Christian life, we are <u>spiritually blind</u> to these things (the Pastor said), "but if <u>we knew</u> the <u>value</u> of them, we would not care how often our nest was stirred up, what kind of trial we had, how sharp a turn-around we had to make in our life, or what false trust we were depending on that fell out from under us.

If we can only realize to the least degree, the great value, the high calling, and the <u>eternal</u> <u>results</u> of <u>going through</u> those <u>temptations</u> in <u>God's</u> way, then we would welcome them.

The <u>apostle James</u> told us that <u>we</u> are to <u>count it</u> nothing but joy (when we <u>fall into many</u> and <u>various kinds of trials</u>), because they <u>work</u> <u>out an enduring faith within our heart</u>. (Jam.1:2-4) "*My brethren*, <u>count it all joy</u> when you fall into various trials, knowing that the <u>testing</u> of <u>your</u> <u>faith</u> produces patience. But <u>let patience</u> have its <u>perfect work</u>, that <u>you</u> may <u>be perfect</u> and <u>complete</u>, lacking nothing." (spiritually). (That means not lacking knowledge of God, and the wisdom to know how to turn to Him in faith in every situation in our life, and to enjoy great spiritual results of being conformed to the likeness of Christ.

Peter told us to <u>be serious</u>, <u>alert</u>, and <u>at-tentive</u> 'when we have battles to meet in our life', <u>because</u> the <u>devil</u> is out to <u>deceive</u> <u>us.</u> (1 Pet.5:8) "Curb every passion, and be on the alert." (That means be sober and vigilant). "Your great accuser the Devil, is going about like a roaring lion to see whom he can <u>devour</u>."

Peter <u>then</u> gave <u>directions</u> to <u>follow</u> in time of battle or testing, (Vs.9) *"Withstand (or resist) him, firm in your faith; knowing that your* brethren in other parts of the world are passing through just the same experiences."

The apostle is telling us to <u>meet that trial</u> or battle in God's way, by resisting the devil in Jesus' Name, and by a final decision on our part to put the trial in God's hands and leave it there, trusting and believing Him for victory in the present moment like Jehoshaphat did.

(2 Chron.20 describes <u>how</u> "<u>Jehosha-</u><u>phat feared</u>" at first (when a multitude of armed warriors came against the Israelites), but he "set himself to <u>seek the Lord</u>,". He prayed (vs.6) "O Lord God of our fathers, are <u>You</u> not <u>God</u> in heaven, and do You not <u>rule over all</u> the <u>king-doms</u> of <u>the nations</u>, and in Your hand is there <u>not</u> power and might, so that no one is able to withstand You?" (Answer Yes, to all)

Jehoshaphat <u>first proclaimed</u> the promised presence and power of God (as he prayed before the assembled Israelites). He then <u>proclaimed</u> the 'stand of trust' on God that <u>they</u> <u>needed to take</u>, to withstand the multitude of devil-controlled enemy in that great trial they were faced with.

(No wonder the apostle Paul referred to our trials as being 'light afflictions' which "<u>last</u> <u>but for a moment"</u>).

Jehoshaphat prayed (vs.9) "If disaster comes upon us—sword, judgment, pestilence, or famine—we will stand before this temple and in Your presence (for Your <u>Name</u> is in this temple), and cry out to You in our affliction, and <u>You will hear</u> and <u>save</u>.'

(In faith), Jehoshaphat put that large army of foes (enemy soldiers) in <u>God's</u> hands, for <u>Him</u> to <u>stop</u> <u>them</u>, just <u>as God</u> <u>will</u> <u>deliver</u> <u>us</u> in time of trial, when we turn our eyes upon God.

(Vs.12), "O our God, will You not judge them? For we have no power against this great multitude that is coming against us; nor do we know what to do, but our eyes are upon You." (That was getting 'self' out of the way and allowing God to deal with their problem).

While the assembly of people were standing there (vs.14-15), *"The Spirit of the Lord came upon Jahaziel the son of Zechariah", ... "in the <u>midst</u> of the assembly. And he said, "Listen, all you of Judah and you inhabitants of*

Jerusalem, and you, King Jehoshaphat! Thus says the Lord to you: `Do not be afraid (nor dismayed) because of this great multitude, for the <u>battle</u> is <u>not yours</u>, but <u>God's</u>."

The prophet said (vs.17), "You will <u>not</u> <u>need to fight</u> in this battle. Position yourselves, stand still and <u>see the salvation of the Lord</u>, who is <u>with you</u>, O <u>Judah</u> and Jerusalem!' Do not <u>fear</u> or be <u>dismayed</u>; tomorrow go out against them, for the <u>Lord</u> is with you."

They could <u>not see</u> their victory <u>yet</u>, but Jehoshaphat and the people of Israel <u>believed</u> the Word of the Lord spoken by the prophet, and they <u>began praising God before seeing</u> their <u>victory</u>.

Scripture tells us that <u>true faith</u> is always on the <u>unseen</u> thing, (<u>not</u> on the things that we can see). (Vs.18-19 say), "And Jehoshaphat bowed his head with his face to the ground, and all Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem bowed before the Lord, worshiping the Lord. Then the Levites of the children of the Kohathites and of the children of the Korhites, stood up to <u>praise the Lord God</u> of Israel with voices loud and high."

The Israelites went out early in the morning, "Jehoshaphat stood and said (vs.20), "Hear me, O Judah and you inhabitants of Jerusalem: <u>Believe</u> in <u>the Lord your God</u>, and <u>you</u> shall be <u>established</u>; <u>believe</u> His prophets, and <u>you</u> shall <u>prosper</u>."

They went out before the army while saying: "Praise the Lord, For His mercy endures forever." (Vs.22) "Now when they began to sing and to praise,... the Lord set ambushes against the people of Ammon, Moab, and Mount Seir, who had come against Judah; <u>and</u> they were <u>defeated</u>."

King Jehoshaphat had followed the directions of (1 Pet. 5:9) long before they were given to us, "*Withstand him* (or resist fear), firm in your faith;".

That means to <u>meet</u> that trial (that battle), in <u>God's way</u>, by putting it into His hands to stay, <u>trusting</u> and <u>believing</u> for <u>your</u> <u>victory</u> <u>at</u> <u>once</u>, just like Jehoshaphat did.

It takes that kind of trial and temptation for God to conform us into the image (likeness) of Christ, for we also have to be <u>tested in our</u> <u>faith</u> as God prepares us for eternity. (Vs.10-11 say), *"And <u>God</u>, the giver of all grace, who has* called you to <u>share</u> His <u>'eternal glory'</u> through Christ", (<u>'eternal glory'</u> means <u>'eternal life'</u>, which <u>depends on</u> our being <u>conformed to</u> the image of Christ, <u>"after</u> you have suffered for a short time, (God) will Himself make you perfect, firm, and strong. To <u>Him</u> be all power unto the Ages of the Ages! Amen."

The apostle James also described the <u>eternal</u> <u>reward</u> for various trials and circumstances that we have to meet according to God's Word. (James 1:12) *"Blessed is the man who <u>endures temptation;</u> for <u>when he has been approved</u> (stood the test), he will <u>receive</u> the 'crown of life' which the Lord has promised to those who love Him."*

That means 'happy, very <u>happy</u> is a man that <u>goes through</u> his <u>trials successfully</u>, for when he has been tried (tested) on all points, and <u>withstood</u> every <u>test</u>, <u>then</u> he will <u>receive</u> the <u>crown</u> of eternal life, which the Lord will give to all of them that love Him.'

God used <u>circumstances</u> in the lives of many <u>true Christians</u> in Bible times, to reveal the true condition of their heart. God is <u>no respecter</u> of <u>persons</u>, and He will use circumstances to convict any one of us today if we have truly <u>surrendered ourselves</u> to <u>follow Jesus Christ</u>.

As God sees a readiness in <u>our heart</u> to <u>accept conviction from Him</u> (and a <u>willingness</u> to <u>confess</u> and <u>repent</u> as <u>true Bible Christians</u> <u>did)</u>, <u>only then</u> can God prepare us for eternal life through the <u>trials</u> and <u>tests</u> that He <u>allows</u> to <u>come our way</u>.

(1 Pet.1:6-7) the apostle <u>emphasizes</u> the <u>spiritual value of meeting trials</u> in God's way, and puts it in its <u>proper perspective</u>, <u>"Rejoice</u> <u>triumphantly</u> in the prospect of this, even if now for a short time, <u>you</u> are <u>compelled</u> to <u>sorrow</u> amid various trials.

The <u>sorrow comes</u> in order that the <u>test-ing of your faith</u>- (being more precious than that of gold, which perishes and yet is proved by fire) may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the re-appearing of Jesus Christ."

That means an <u>eternal reward</u> is promised for turning our life back to God, and being <u>willing</u> to give <u>Him</u> the <u>opportunity</u> to use every circumstance from the least to the greatest that touches us, in order to <u>conform</u> us into the <u>'im-</u> age of <u>Jesus Christ</u>'. In **summary**, it <u>is very serious business</u> we are in (<u>all-important</u> business), so we need to be <u>careful</u> that we deal with trials and tests according to the <u>guidelines</u> of Scripture.

Apostle Paul told us how seriously he considered His <u>being prepared for eternity</u>. (Phil.3:12-14) "striving to lay hold of the prize for which also Christ has laid hold of me. Brethren, I <u>do not imagine</u> that I have <u>yet laid hold of it</u>. But this <u>one thing</u> I do--forgetting everything which is past and stretching forward to what lies in front of me, with my eyes fixed on the goal, I <u>push on</u> to <u>secure the prize</u> of God's heavenward call in Christ Jesus."

If we will take the Truth of God's Word seriously and allow God to deal with us (as Paul did), then we will have rapid growth and development in the full Truth of God, and He will eventually conform us to the image of Jesus Christ.

Being conformed to the likeness of Christ may be a <u>humbling experience</u> for most of us, but it <u>must take place in our heart</u>, and <u>God</u> waits patiently to <u>do that</u> for <u>us.</u> Jesus set the example of what it means to <u>humble ourselves</u> before God's workmanship, because <u>God's</u> reward is <u>eternal</u>.

(Phil. 2:8-9), "And being found <u>in appear-ance</u> <u>as a man</u>, He <u>humbled</u> Himself and became <u>obedient to the point of death</u>, even the death of <u>the cross</u>. Therefore, <u>God</u> also <u>has</u> <u>highly exalted</u> Him and given Him the name which is above every name,."

The <u>wonderful</u> thing about being made into the <u>likeness</u> of Christ, <u>is</u> that we are <u>then</u> in a <u>position</u> where <u>God</u> can <u>give</u> <u>us</u> <u>every</u> <u>bless-</u> <u>ing</u> of Heaven above and the earth beneath, (just as He did for Abraham, who <u>passed</u> <u>his</u> <u>'graduation</u> <u>test'</u>).

And, <u>best</u> of <u>all</u>, God's Spirit will have prepared us to <u>be ready</u> when <u>Jesus comes</u>, for our <u>successful entrance into His</u> <u>everlasting</u> <u>Kingdom</u>... [Conformed to Christ's Image, by God the Father... just <u>as He</u> promised!!]

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MP 1... <u>God</u> uses circumstances and things that are said and done toward us, to develop our Christian character and conform us into the likeness of Jesus Christ—as

that is His <u>calling</u> for us (even more-so after being baptized and committing our life back to God), (and so, Jesus set an <u>example</u> for us, <u>how to meet things</u> in a <u>right way</u>).

2... The apostles Peter, Paul, and James, all emphasized the true <u>value</u> of the circumstances and temptations that <u>God</u> allows us to go through in our life, (as 'He' strives to perfect a Christian character within and prepare us to enter His everlasting Kingdom)

3...The writer to the Hebrews admonished that we are not to despise the chastening of the Lord (meaning, don't regard it lightly nor be fearful when in trial), for God is trying to save you from sins of a life of self(and He uses every circumstance in our life to teach us).

4...If we can <u>only realize</u> the great <u>'value'</u>, the <u>high 'call-</u> ing', and the great <u>results</u> of going through <u>temptations</u> in <u>God's</u> way, then <u>we would welcome</u> them and <u>praise</u> <u>God</u> even <u>before</u> we see our victory.

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
