MEETING TEMPTATIONS RIGHT (BRINGS SPIRITUAL GROWTH)

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'<u>Victory over temptation</u> 'in a Christian's life is directly involved with <u>their pursuit of eternal Life</u> hereafter (and the devil knows that only too well). That is why he <u>prowls</u> about, and always trying to <u>rob</u> someone of their atonement right to <u>be delivered from</u> temptation and trial. The truth <u>is</u> that all trials are from the devil in the first place, and <u>that</u> is something that we must all come to realize. (James 1:13-14) plainly tells us "Let <u>no one say</u> when he is tempted, "I am tempted by God"; for God <u>cannot</u> be tempted by <u>evil</u>, nor does He Himself tempt anyone. But each one is tempted when he is drawn away by his <u>own desires</u> and <u>enticed</u>."

It is, however, <u>because</u> of temptations that we go through... (successfully enduring), that our <u>faith grows</u> and develops, and every temptation can be <u>used</u> by <u>God</u> as a 'stepping-stone' toward receiving <u>everything we need</u> in <u>this life</u> (and have <u>Scriptural</u> <u>desires fulfilled</u>), as well as our preparation for eternity. God uses the temptations and trials we go through (when we meet them in His way), to <u>perfect</u> everything concerning us (our <u>spiritual life</u>, our <u>bodies</u>, our home life), <u>perfecting us</u> in financial matters and in everything else; <u>most importantly</u> to prepare us to <u>meet Jesus</u> and to <u>receive</u> 'eternal Life'. Being in the <u>real Truth</u> of God, is the <u>only place</u> in the whole universe that trouble (when met right) becomes the richest of all blessings to a believer. The <u>value</u> of <u>eternal results</u> for meeting temptations Scripturally, is <u>too</u> wonderful to comprehend.

All that God instructs us to do to meet temptations according to Scripture, is to have faith in the 'resurrected Christ' and on the <u>power</u> of His atonement Blood shed on the Cross. Thomas <u>doubted</u> that 'the resurrection of Jesus Christ' was a <u>true fact</u>, and he said (John 20:25), "Unless I see in his hands the wound made by the nails and put my finger into the wound (he was going by sight), and put my hand into his side(going by feeling), I will never believe it."

However, <u>God</u> in His <u>mercy</u> gave Thomas the <u>opportunity</u> to prove that it was true. (26-29), "Jesus came-(though the doors were locked)-and stood in their midst, and said, "Peace be to you." Then He said to Thomas, "Bring your finger here and feel my hands; bring your hand and put it into my side; and do not be ready to disbelieve but to <u>believe</u>." "My Lord and my God!" replied Thomas. "Because you have seen me," replied Jesus, "you have believed. <u>Blessed are those</u> who have not <u>seen</u> and <u>yet have believed</u>."

To confess our sins to God, repent of them, and <u>believe</u> on the power of Jesus' shed Blood, is the divine order and plan for 'God's pathway to victory' (over temptations from the devil), and it is all part of our preparation for eternal Life.

<u>Satan's</u> object is to get us to do something <u>un-S</u>criptural, to trust in some efforts of our own, or in some thing or somebody else besides God. To "Resist steadfast in faith" means we are not to yield to that temptation. (James 1:12) "Blessed is he who patiently <u>endures trials</u>; for <u>when...</u>he has <u>stood the test</u>, he will gain the victor's crown-- even the <u>crown of Life</u>--which the Lord has promised to those who love Him." That does <u>not</u> mean that we have no love for God if we make a mistake or have a failure, <u>nor</u> that it is the end of us. <u>Not at all</u>!!... But it <u>does mean</u> that we will have to go back and meet it right (by faith and trust on God this time) before we can make further <u>progress</u> in the Truth. We must get <u>reconnected</u> to God <u>by faith</u>. We cannot cover it up and let it go without a real <u>surrender</u> at that point. The sooner we do so, the better it will be for us spiritually, because we have not time to waste in getting back to trusting faith on God.

All temptation and wrong desires come from an evil nature of 'self' in our heart (which God wants to remove so He can prepare us to be worthy of eternal Life). It can take a serious temptation (a very hard test) to rid us of the self-trust that we were born with, and to get the last bit of it exposed and entirely gotten rid of, but it 'must' be removed from our heart. God will remove 'self' from our heart if we will make our choice to turn to Him in times of temptation. As soon as we realize that the trial is from the devil and put the blame on him, our battles are half won, because the devil will never work in the open (but only under cover). When we put another name to a problem or an attack (such as, calling it a 'cold' or some type of 'sickness'), we are just giving the devil a 'cover' to work under, or something to hide behind, while he continues to attack. We must resist the devil 'steadfast in faith' in the Name of Jesus truly believe that Satan is defeated in Jesus' Name, .. and the devil will flee (because he has to flee from the power of God). He cannot stand against it. Aside from that, when Jesus was resurrected from the dead, the devil's power was broken and defeated forever (through faith on the death and resurrection power of Christ). (Heb. 2:14 says) "that through death He might render powerless him who had 'authority over death', that is, the Devil,".

Bible characters were <u>tempted</u> in many different ways, and <u>God's</u> object in <u>allowing the temptations</u>, is to deliver us from spiritual blindness, ignorance of <u>the Truth</u> of <u>His</u> <u>Word</u> and <u>all</u> <u>that</u> it <u>stands</u> <u>for</u>, in overcoming our weaknesses, and to bring us to a knowledge of Himself, to make us victorious over every power of the enemy. SATAN!

God told the Israelites that He led them through that desert wilderness to suffer hunger and do without water for three days, and when they did find some water it was bitter (a further <u>test</u> to see whether or not they would be faithful to trust Him, or to complain against Him). They murmured against Moses, and they would have done him bodily harm if God had not been with him and protected him. Moses turned to God in a prayer of faith, and God showed him a branch of a tree, which he was to throw into that stream of bitter water, and it would become sweet and drinkable. Nothing but blessing followed that answer to prayer, by which Moses had acted in faith on God's word that He would heal that bitter water.

God spoke to the Israelites through Moses (Duet.8:2-3) "And you shall remember that the Lord your God led you all the way these forty years in the wilderness, to <u>humble</u> you and to <u>test</u> you, to know <u>what was in your heart</u>, <u>whether</u> you would keep His commandments or <u>not</u>. "So, He humbled you, <u>allowed</u> you to hunger, and fed you with manna which you did not know nor did your fathers know, that He might make you know that man shall not live by bread alone; but man lives by every <u>word</u> that proceeds from the mouth of the Lord."

Later on, fiery serpents came among them and destroyed many lives, but when those people went before God and confessed their sins, they were delivered. In their later years all these trials gone through proved to be good for the growth and development of their faith; therefore, again confirming that temptation met in God's way leads to `fullness of blessing' in this life.

Jesus' Blood <u>has purchased</u> that <u>fullness of blessing for us</u> in everything; that is, perfect happiness spiritually, physically, and financially; peace in our homes and in Christian work. Everything is to be ideal in Christ Jesus (just as we would like it to be), and <u>by faith</u> on God's <u>written Word</u> we can have it that way. We can have whatever Scriptural desire is in our heart and be victorious in every part of our life of faith because it has been purchased for us, and our meeting temptation successfully in God's way is the road to that deliverance. By <u>our freewill choice</u> we can surrender our 'life of self', be delivered by God from our spiritual ignorance and blindness to the Truth of His Word, and by that knowledge He gives us and faith on His 'promises', we enter into 'fullness of blessing' (while at the same time having our Christian characters <u>perfected</u>). <u>That is the value of temptations met according to God's plan</u>.

A point which seems to be generally <u>overlooked</u> in the professed Christian world, (but which is the gateway to fullness of blessing), is to <u>learn full</u> <u>obedience</u> to <u>God's</u> <u>Word</u> as it is taught in the New Testament. Obedience to God's plan for our spiritual progress is by <u>allowing the Holy Spirit</u> to <u>teach</u> <u>us</u> <u>how</u> to <u>meet</u> <u>every</u> circumstance <u>right</u>. Obediently following God's financial plan of trusting Him (and not letting our needs be known to anyone else but Him) is the <u>`pathway</u> to many <u>blessings'</u>. Also, God's plan of trusting Him for perfect health and the protection of our body, and, going to Him in real faith for healing from illness or any other oppression is most important and necessary.

If we are willing to trust God for perfect health in our body (and for our children), Jesus said, we are to believe God's Word and that He wants to furnish the grace for us to believe <u>and to act in</u> <u>faith</u> on His Word, in order to receive that victory that we want and pray for. (Mark 11:24) "That is why I tell you, as to whatever you pray and make request for, if you believe that you have received it... it shall be yours."

God gives us the power to believe, as well as giving us the deliverance, so we should not tolerate anything short of perfect health. Therefore, we should <u>not lie around</u>, because Jesus died that we might have <u>perfect health</u>. When we settle it in heart and mind to tolerate <u>nothing less</u> than what <u>belongs to us</u> through the power of Jesus' Blood,... <u>God</u> is <u>right there</u> to give us perfect health.

Consider the case of King Ahab who had received an ultimatum from Ben-Hadad the King of Syria to give up his wives, children, gold, and silver. Ahab <u>consented</u> to give all those things over to him. Ben-Hadad then said he was going to search the homes of the people of Israel and take anything from them that pleased him.

A prophet of the Lord told King Ahab that <u>God wanted him</u> to do battle with the Syrian army, and that God would deliver Israel from them. <u>When</u> King Ahab <u>decided</u> to follow the prophet's word from God, the Lord gave him spiritual grace to settle it to claim and have his rights <u>according to God's Word</u>. The Syrian army was defeated by the power of God, and Israel had peace restored for a while.

God gave the <u>same</u> <u>instruction</u> to us (James 4:7-8) "Submit therefore to God: resist the Devil, and he will flee from you. Draw near to God, and He will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands (by faith in Christ), you sinners, and make your hearts <u>pure</u>, you who are half-hearted towards God."

We are also to keep <u>strict</u> <u>obedience</u> to the Word of God, and to <u>learn</u> <u>obedience</u> through meeting trials according to God's plan of faith and trust on Him to deliver us, as Jesus learned obedience by the things He suffered, and temptations that He went through in the 'likeness of man'.(Heb.5:8) "Although He was <u>God's</u> <u>Son</u>, yet He learned <u>obedience</u> from the <u>sufferings</u> which <u>He</u> <u>endured</u>; and so, <u>having been made perfect</u>, He became to <u>all</u> who <u>obey Him</u>, the <u>source</u> and <u>giver</u> of <u>eternal</u> <u>salvation</u>." (We should all take notice of God's promise of an 'eternal reward' for our obedience to His Word).

Jesus was protected by God's divine power when He had to go through trials (in all the ways that we do), in order to be an example for each one of us. The Bible says that He was tried in all ways through suffering, and His obedience was unto death. (Phil. 2:5-8) "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus, who, being in the form of God, did not consider it robbery to be equal with God, but made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bond-servant, and coming in the likeness of men. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death, even the death of the cross."

<u>Obedience</u> is like a lost art regarding divine things today. People are being taught (by even worse <u>delusions</u> than 'Christian Science'), that one can <u>get</u> to <u>Heaven</u> and get <u>Eternal</u> <u>Life</u> <u>without</u> <u>being obedient</u> to the <u>Word of</u> <u>God</u>. Such a teaching is totally <u>un-</u> <u>Scriptural</u>. False <u>teachers</u> say we had to obey under the Law, but under the Gospel of Jesus Christ we are given Eternal Life without <u>obedience</u>. Scripture does not support such erroneous doctrine. Those people do not know where to draw the line between the Law and the Gospel. We are told not to add to (nor take from) the 'Word of God'. The <u>difference</u> between the Law and the Gospel is that people had to obey the Law in <u>their</u> own strength, but under the Gospel we are to obey in the strength of God. There is all the difference in the world by what power that obedience is to be accomplished.

For those OSAS proponents and other groups who want to <u>separate</u> obedience from faith on God, the Bible tells us that when Jesus brought the apostle Paul to conviction, He said to him (Acts 26:18), "I <u>send</u> you to <u>open their eyes</u>, that they may turn from <u>darkness</u> to <u>light</u> and from the <u>obedience</u> to Satan (to obedience) to <u>God</u>, <u>in</u> <u>order to receive forgiveness of sins and an inheritance among those</u> who are <u>sanctified through faith</u> in Me.'

There is <u>all the difference</u> in the world by <u>what power</u> that <u>obedience</u> is to <u>be</u> <u>accomplished</u>. The Law was given to prove that we could not be obedient in our own strength; the Gospel was given to prove to us that we <u>could be</u> <u>obedient</u> in <u>God's strength</u>. That is <u>the</u> <u>reason</u> for every <u>temptation</u>, every <u>trial</u>, every <u>weakness</u>, and <u>infirmity</u>. It is to <u>enthrone</u> the <u>life of</u> <u>Christ</u> <u>within</u> <u>us</u> (in all His fullness) and cause us to grow and develop into the image of Jesus Christ, with a full knowledge of God and His Word, which will bring us fullness of blessing in everything. The gateway to that fullness of blessing, however, is a conscientious, sincere, and <u>full</u> <u>obedience</u> to every <u>command</u> of God. Even the <u>least</u> one (to our finite mind) is to be obeyed if it cost us our life. That is to be the '<u>standard for our obedience'</u> to <u>God's Word</u> (and <u>faith</u> for the fulfillment of His 'promises').

(As an <u>illustration</u>) during the time of Queen Esther in Media and Persia, Haman was made 'Prime Minister'. The law of the land was that Mordecai(a <u>Jew</u> who had <u>been captured</u> and <u>brought there</u>) was supposed to bow down and reverence the Prime Minister. That would, however, have been a <u>dis-obedience</u> to <u>God's command</u> in an indirect way. It <u>seemed to be a small matter of disobedience</u> then, and today would hardly be considered an act of disobedience in <u>most</u> religious circles (with most professed Christians giving in to most every plan of man and Satan). Haman was a <u>descendent of King Agag</u> of Amalek, and God had said, that the Jews were to <u>have no fellowship with</u> the Amalekites (with whom '<u>He'</u> would have war with for all generations to come) (Exodus 17:16). That would apply to not doing them honor (and certainly not bowing down to them in worship).

God said we are to worship Him only(which means not to trust in anybody else or any other thing, plan, or policy set up by man). So Mordecai would not bow down to Haman the Amalekite just to obey a <u>law of man</u>. It would have been disobedience of God's Word (our only roadmap to Heaven). Mordecai refused to bow down to Haman. Instead, he <u>prayed to God</u> for the Jews to be delivered from the King's <u>un-</u> Scriptural Laws (and decrees which would have annihilated them). Most are <u>familiar</u> with the rest of the story, where wicked Haman was hanged on the same gallows he had set up to hang Mordecai. A clear example of the results for one who obeys <u>God's</u> plan for <u>obedience</u> to <u>His</u> <u>Word</u>. That's what Jesus meant when He said (Matt.7: 24) "Everyone who hears these my teachings and <u>acts upon them</u>, will be found to resemble a wise man who builds his house upon rock;".

How important it is to read and study the Word of God, to learn just what it means, and how we should meet every circumstance in life. How important to know that we can <u>have our heart cleansed from</u> all sin and be filled with the Holy Spirit.

After we have surrendered to do God's will in our life (and we are cleansed and filled with the Spirit of God), <u>our obedience</u> to <u>His Word will not be difficult</u> at all. It will just <u>follow our</u> <u>desire</u> to <u>do God's will</u>, and we will <u>learn how valuable it is</u> to meet temptations in God's way (and reap rich spiritual rewards and preparation for Eternal Life). There must be (and will be) continual heart purifying and indwelling of the Holy Spirit in our life. Outside of taking that submissive and obedient position, there is no true obedience. But <u>spiritual rewards</u> are more than we can imagine.

(1 Pet. 5:9) encourages true 'believers' "Resist Satan steadfast in faith" (which means we are not to yield to his temptation). We can easily see the great importance of it all, because in any circumstance we may be, we can still be taught and trained by God through temptation and trial in our life. (11) "To Him be the glory and the dominion forever and ever. Amen."

We show our love for God by not turning our trust to some other person or thing, when tempted.
