## **CHRISTIAN FAITH WORKS ACTIVELY**

S180R(Ref.S46R) (Ref. 1 John 5:14-15) WED 11/11/2020

For many years the opinions among professed Christian have been many and varied, when trying to discern the difference between 'active faith' and 'works of self'. A true Christian should have clear understanding of the difference between the 'works of faith', and that of mere <u>outward</u> <u>actions</u> of a <u>self-life</u> (which have no <u>spiritual</u> value or <u>merit</u>). A life of 'active faith' (at the feet of Jesus Christ), means to place oneself (and family) by <u>faith</u> at the foot of the Cross of Christ , and taking our requests to God in prayer(in Jesus' Name), with our trust solely <u>on</u> God's promises. It <u>is</u> the <u>only</u> place where 'spiritual growth' can come from,(that most <u>necessary</u> 'growth in holiness, apart from which no one will see the Lord."(Heb.12:14)

Many people say that <u>obedience</u> to God's Word is <u>works</u>, and therefore one is trying to work their way into Heaven instead of being 'saved by <u>grace' through faith</u> on the Son of God. <u>They say</u> that they are not required to obey God's Word on finances, divine healing, or other instructions He has given in His Word. God's <u>Word</u>, however, <u>says</u> to '<u>believe on His Son'</u>, and that command <u>must</u> <u>be obeyed</u>, for it is <u>above all else</u> what God <u>requires</u> of everyone (the one <u>condition</u> that God places on His will, and <u>His</u> plan for our Salvation.

Many people think that obedience to God's Word is not directly connected to an active faith in His Son, but faith and obedience are never separated in the Bible. To label faithful obedience <u>as</u> <u>works</u>, is an attempt to find <u>excuse</u> for <u>unscriptural</u> ways and <u>dis</u>obedience to God's Word. We first have to believe and <u>accept</u>, that Jesus was giving us <u>God's</u> <u>Word</u> which we are to <u>obey</u>,... that is, to have a <u>forgiving</u> heart toward those who dislike us; <u>trust Him</u> financially, and to <u>scripturally</u> use the money that passes through our hands (and to <u>not</u> go into debt); also to trust Him for healing of the body and not rely on drugs, medicine, and doctors;(and, <u>many other</u> issues of life). The truth <u>is</u> that if one does not truly believe a word given to them, they can not faithfully <u>obey</u> that word. Faith does not work that way. Faith can not obey due to <u>unbelief</u>. Why would a person put faith in something that they did not believe was true?

However, <u>God's 'Promises'</u> all have '<u>yes'</u> at the end of them, and <u>that</u> is what we are to 'believe' if we want to place our trust in God's '<u>Promises'</u>. Every time we pray for all those things which Jesus <u>has already purchased</u> with His own blood for <u>us</u>, those <u>'Promises'</u> are <u>saying</u> to us, that God has <u>already</u> heard and <u>answered</u> our prayer. [When we pray, we are really asking to see God's <u>mercy</u>, which He has <u>already extended</u> to us through the Atonement work of His Son on the Cross. We should believe we have received the first time we pray, and not have to keep pleading for God's mercy(for the same thing) because of our <u>unbelief</u>. That is a <u>principle</u> of Truth that the Holy Spirit <u>has</u> to <u>teach</u> all of us. That is <u>why</u> the <u>spiritual blessing</u> received (with each answer to a prayer made in faith), is so <u>important</u> in the Christian life.]

There are three actions of real faith for a Christian; which are '<u>ask'</u>, '<u>believe</u>', and '<u>receive</u>'. That <u>is God's</u> "<u>plan for our deliverance</u>". After we have <u>definitely</u> placed our request before God (with no reservations),...we should not <u>doubt</u> (nor have to repeat the same specific request over and over, which would <u>indicate doubt</u>, or, <u>not believing</u> for what we had prayed). <u>Rather</u>, we continue with our 'stand of faith' to <u>receive</u> an answer to our prayer, along with a <u>request</u> to be shown <u>why</u> we <u>have not received</u>. The <u>'condition'</u> for receiving our answers to prayer, is to <u>believe</u> that we <u>have already</u> received them. (Mark 11:24), "What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, <u>'believe'</u> that ye <u>have</u> received them (Jesus said), and ye <u>shall</u> have them."

Therefore, if we have <u>really believed</u> that God has heard and answered our prayer, why should we ask again and again (for the <u>same</u> thing?)(the late Pastor queried). If one of our children would ask for the privilege to go somewhere, and we had told them, "yes, you may go,"...then they would ask the same question again and again,... we would conclude that they did not really <u>believe</u> us when we had said 'yes' the first time they asked.

(1 John 5:14-15)says, "And we have an <u>assured confidence</u> that whenever we ask anything <u>in</u> <u>accordance with His will</u>, He listens to us. And since we <u>know</u> that He listens to us, then whatever we ask, we know that we have the things which we have asked from Him." (By faith on the power of the Atonement Blood of Jesus Christ, we can have every scriptural prayer answered.)

This being <u>true</u>, <u>why</u> should we ask again and again instead of <u>believing</u> to <u>receive</u> what we had already prayed for. The <u>devil</u> wants us to <u>surrender our Atonement right</u> to pray <u>and receive by</u> <u>faith</u>.

An example of this is in the case of the nobleman whose boy was sick, (John 4:46-54). He came to Jesus and first <u>asked</u> Him to heal his son. Jesus said, "Except ye see signs and wonders, ye will not believe." That answer did not grant the father's request, but he <u>refused to doubt</u> nor <u>give up</u> on the request that he had already made (so he <u>said</u> in faith), "Sir, come down before my child dies." (He was still <u>believing</u> that his prayer would be answered). Jesus then gave the man His <u>Word</u> (His <u>Promise</u>), <u>instead</u> of going with him, and h<u>ere</u> is where we see the 'works of faith' taking <u>action</u>, for the man <u>believed</u> the <u>words</u> of the Son of God. (We want to take note of <u>that</u>, because if <u>we believe</u> His <u>'written'</u> Word, it should mean the <u>same</u> to us <u>today</u> as His <u>'spoken'</u> Word meant to <u>that man</u> whose boy was sick.)

"You may return home," replied Jesus; "your son has recovered." He chose to<u>'believe'</u> the words of Jesus and he started back home; (that is faith in action), and he was already on his way down when his servants met him and told him that his son was alive and well. So, he inquired of them at <u>what hour</u> he had shown improvement. "Yesterday, about seven o'clock," they replied "the fever left him." Then the father recollected that <u>that</u> was the time at which Jesus had said to him, "Your son has recovered," and he and his <u>whole household</u> became <u>'believers'</u>."(That man's <u>'work of faith'</u> (or his <u>'faith in action'</u>), <u>bore fruit</u> within his <u>whole</u> household. His <u>faith</u> was(and is) a 'light' for others to see and understand.)

God's written Promises should mean the same to us, as if He were standing here <u>telling us</u> that He has heard <u>and</u> answered our prayers. We want to <u>ask</u> God in a personal, fervent, and private prayer, to reveal the <u>hindrance</u>, or <u>where our</u> faith is <u>'lacking'</u>, and for Him to <u>strengthen our faith</u>, just as Jesus' disciples asked Him, "strengthen our weak faith".

It is the 'believers' <u>responsibility</u> to leave themselves 'open to God's <u>conviction</u>' each day, to be shown <u>why</u> the answers to their prayer (or prayers) have been hindered. <u>Why</u> they have not been receiving when asking in Jesus' Name. <u>Where</u> our <u>faith</u> is <u>lacking</u>, or where we have fallen short in <u>doing God's</u> 'will'.

Jesus explained how <u>important</u> it is for each person to <u>do</u> God's 'will' in everything that we do. (Matt. 7:21-23), "Not everyone who says to Me, `Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who <u>does</u> the <u>will</u> of My Father in heaven. (Weymouth.says), "but <u>only those</u> who are <u>obedient to</u> my Father who is in Heaven".) "<u>Many</u> will say to Me in that day, `Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?! "And then I

will <u>declare to them</u>, `I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice <u>lawlessness</u>!" (Faith and obedience are never separated in Bible teaching)!

<u>Saying</u>, Lord, Lord, but n<u>ot</u> trusting(nor believing) in God's Son for things in this life, is <u>not</u> <u>doing</u> His 'will', because God's command is to <u>trust</u> in the One whom He has sent. That is <u>God's law</u> for everyone, so it <u>is lawlessness not</u> to put an active faith in God's Son for things in this life. <u>Jesus'</u> said "teach them to <u>obey every command</u> which I have given you."(Matt. 28:20).

Many <u>false teachers</u> are prophesying, and telling others of wonders done in Jesus' Name, but most are not <u>doing</u> (nor obeying) <u>God's will</u> themselves, by <u>trust</u> in God's Son for healing, finances, meeting other people right, and many other life issues. <u>"All</u> conduct <u>not based on faith</u> is <u>sinful</u>."(says Rom. 14:23). (repeat) Thus, not acting in faith nor setting an <u>example</u> for <u>others</u> to 'act in faith' is sinful, and it is lawlessness. Jesus said of those who hinder the faith of others by setting wrong <u>examples</u>, "And then I will <u>declare to them</u>, `I never knew you; depart from Me, you who <u>practice lawlessness</u>!"

(Using food as an <u>analogy</u>), the apostle Paul explained even further, that 'brotherly love' should limit the freedom of our <u>own</u> actions. (Rom. 14:15) "If your brother is pained by the food <u>you</u> are eating, your <u>'conduct'</u> is no longer controlled <u>by love</u>. Take care lest, by the food you eat, you lead to ruin a man <u>for</u> whom <u>Christ died</u>." "<u>Right conduct</u>, <u>peace</u> and <u>joy</u>, through the <u>Holy Spirit</u>;" is <u>what</u> the "Kingdom of God <u>consists</u> of" (he explained vs.17).

"To <u>forego</u> doing anything that <u>tends</u> to your brother's fall, is the <u>right</u> course" (he said,(21). (And, 22) "As for you and your faith, keep your faith to yourself in the <u>presence</u> of God. The man is to be congratulated who does not pronounce judgement on himself in <u>what his actions sanction</u>." Paul concluded that a Christian should not engage in conduct that would <u>defile</u> their <u>own conscience</u>, because their faith is <u>guided</u> by their conscience <u>through</u> the <u>Holy Spirit</u>.(23)"But he who has <u>misgivings</u> and yet eats meat is condemned already, because his <u>conduct</u> is <u>not based</u> on <u>faith</u>; for <u>all</u> <u>conduct not</u> 'based on faith' is <u>sinful</u>."

The <u>second action</u> of receiving through our 'works of faith', is to <u>rejoice</u> and praise and '<u>thank'</u> God for the deliverance, (even before we <u>see</u> or <u>feel</u> the deliverance or answer to our prayer). That is 'stepping out' <u>in faith</u> (or 'acting out') our faith, <u>because</u> we are 'believing' His Word that our prayer is answered. It <u>is</u> the 'works of faith' that God's <u>Spirit</u> will inspire from within, <u>as</u> we 'believe',... <u>because</u>, Jesus said that the Spirit He would send to us, is for 'believers', (not for <u>unbelievers</u> in the world), because "The <u>world cannot</u> receive Him", Jesus said.(John 14:17).

If we were in a time of trial or going through a temptation from the devil, and we had placed the whole matter in God's hands <u>definitely</u>, for <u>Him</u> to deliver us,... and we <u>really</u> 'BELIEVED' in our <u>heart</u> that we <u>had</u> the <u>answer</u>", (the Pastor queried), "<u>how</u> could we do anything <u>but</u> '<u>rejoice</u>'(and <u>thank</u>' God). <u>Real faith, 'rejoices</u> in the <u>Promises'</u>,... as much <u>as</u> if it <u>sees</u> the deliverance, and is already enjoying it by sight and feeling. (This is because we truly believe on the <u>power</u> of the Atonement Blood of Christ, also, that it <u>supports</u> every promise from God. (2 Cor. 1:19-20) "For Jesus Christ the Son of God-He who was proclaimed among you by us,- did not show Himself a <u>waverer</u> between "Yes" and "No." But it <u>was</u> and always <u>is</u> "Yes" with Him. For all the promises of God, whatever their number, have their <u>confirmation in Him</u>; and for this reason <u>through</u> Him also our "Amen" acknowledges their truth and <u>promotes</u> the glory of God <u>through our faith</u>."(That is receiving by faith,... it is the <u>'works of faith</u>', and it <u>is not</u> trying to 'work one's way into Heaven'.)

When we <u>truly</u> believe in <u>what</u> Christ's Atonement sacrifice has accomplished <u>for us</u>, we will be compelled by the Holy Spirit to place our trust on <u>God's promises</u> (<u>not</u> on man's plans and promises), because we feel <u>sure</u> that God is <u>faithful</u> to His.

(Again, 1 John 5:14-15), "And we have an <u>assured</u> confidence that whenever we ask anything in accordance with His will, He listens to us. And since we know that He listens to us, then whatever we ask, we know that we have the things which we have asked from Him." With this being <u>true</u>, <u>why</u> should we ask (for the same thing) again?

The faith of believers (and their corresponding actions) were always linked together in the Bible(and proved successful for them). The lame man carried by four men(Mark 2:), did not go back home discouraged (when he saw the crowd at the door), because he truly believed that the Son of God would heal him. Jesus knew the man's 'heart' (and that he was believing), so He told him his sins were forgiven,... and the man 'believed' His Word. Jesus said, "`Rise, take up your mat and go home.'" "The man rose" (because he believed, and he began to act out genuine faith), "and immediately under the eyes of all, took up his mat and went out. They were all filled with astonishment, gave the glory to God, and said, "We never saw anything like this." The moment the lame man believed the words of Jesus(and acted on them),...health and strength came into his body.

(Luke 17:), Jesus (seeing that they had <u>faith</u> for healing), told the ten <u>lepers</u> (vs.14), "Go and show yourselves to the Priests." And <u>while on their way</u> to <u>do</u> this" (which was <u>their</u> 'works of faith'), "they were <u>made clean</u>."

There was no <u>evidence</u> of healing at that moment. Jesus had only <u>spoken</u> the Word to them, but, they <u>chose</u> to <u>believe</u> His <u>spoken</u> <u>Word</u>(using their 'power of choice', just as <u>we</u> can choose to <u>believe</u> His <u>written</u> Word). They went away <u>acting</u> exactly the same as if they already <u>had</u> their healing, because they were seeing themselves <u>well</u> by faith. By <u>acting out</u> faith, <u>their faith</u> was <u>perfected</u>, and their bodies healed. It is written, "<u>as</u> they went, they were cleansed."

Take notice <u>what</u> Jesus <u>said</u> to the cleansed man. (Vs.19) "Rise and go: your <u>faith</u> has cured you." (The lepers first had to <u>believe</u> the <u>Word</u>. As result, the Holy Spirit then enabled them to <u>act</u> <u>in faith</u>,..and they were cured. <u>If</u> they had not <u>first</u> <u>believed</u>, they could not have <u>acted</u> <u>out</u> their 'faith',... however, Jesus explained that the Holy Spirit is received by <u>believers</u> (not <u>unbelievers</u>).

<u>Acting out our</u> faith because we <u>believe</u> on what the Atonement sacrifice has already done for us, and the <u>spiritual blessing</u> that we will receive from doing so, will <u>result</u> in our <u>wanting</u> to serve and trust <u>God</u> for <u>everything</u> in our life.

Because Abraham first 'believed' in God's promise, he was then able to <u>obey</u> God by leaving his home to travel to an <u>unknown</u> destination, "a place that I will show you",... (was all that God had told him). (Gen. 15:6), "And Abraham <u>believed</u> God, and his faith was placed to his credit as righteousness."

The examples of Abraham, the lame man, the ten lepers(and <u>other</u> Bible examples), <u>all</u> have <u>one thing</u> in <u>common</u>. Their active faith in <u>unseen</u> results ('acting' as if they <u>could already see</u> the results), brought <u>their</u> victory. (1 John 3:22), "and whatever <u>we ask for</u> we obtain from Him, <u>'because'</u> we <u>obey</u> His commands and <u>do</u> the things which are pleasing in His sight." (23) "And this <u>is</u> His command--that we are to <u>believe</u> in His Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as <u>He</u> has <u>commanded us</u> to do."

A <u>close union</u> with Christ, comes <u>through</u> an <u>'obedient</u> faith' in God (John 15:10, <u>Jesus</u> said), <u>"If</u> you <u>keep</u> My commandments, you <u>will abide</u> in My love, just as I have kept My Father's commandments and abide in His love." Apostle Paul explained(1 Cor. 7:19), <u>"obedience</u> to God's <u>commandments</u> is <u>everything</u>." (And, Gal. 5:), that <u>outward religion</u> means <u>nothing</u>, (6)"The only thing that counts is <u>'faith'</u> expressing itself through <u>love</u>." A <u>life</u> of <u>trust</u> in Jesus in faith at His feet (because we love Him and <u>want</u> to <u>obey</u> Him), is the <u>only</u> place to receive <u>spiritual growth</u>.

(James 2:14, the apostle was inspired to say), "What good is it, my brethren, if a man professes to have faith, and yet his actions do not correspond? Can such faith save him?" "Thus also

faith by itself, <u>if</u> it does not have <u>works</u>(or actions) is <u>dead</u>." This <u>vital principal</u> is <u>not</u> <u>recognized</u> by multitudes of people who are <u>not acting</u> in <u>harmony with</u> their <u>professed</u> faith. The average Christian <u>claims</u> to be trusting and believing in God, but in time of temptation and trial they turn their <u>trust</u> to <u>other</u> things. They <u>act</u> opposite from the faith they <u>profess</u> in God, by seeking help from many plans of man.

(In summary), when we truly <u>'believe'</u>, <u>and</u>, <u>as</u> we 'place our trust' on <u>God's</u> Promises (forsaking the inclinations of <u>self</u>), that <u>is</u> faith <u>working</u> through <u>love</u> for Christ. It is <u>evidence</u> that we <u>'believe'</u> in <u>what</u> the '<u>power</u>' of His <u>shed blood on the Cross has done</u> for us. We are then on our way toward having the <u>conditions</u> of the Garden of Eden restored in our life, because God has not changed and He will do the <u>same things</u> for us as He <u>did</u> for <u>people</u> in the Bible who acted in faith. <u>Everything</u> in the true Christian life <u>is by</u> <u>'faith'</u>. We can't be reminded too often of that <u>vital Truth</u>!!

When we <u>refuse</u> to <u>place</u> our trust in something else (<u>because</u> God <u>told us</u> to <u>trust</u> on the <u>One</u> whom <u>He</u> has <u>sent</u>), <u>that is not</u> 'outward <u>works'</u> (nor is it trying to earn our way into Heaven), because it is "<u>by faith</u>" that we are "saved by Grace". It shows, rather, that "those who <u>possess faith,..</u> are <u>true sons of Abraham</u>".

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S180R SOME MAIN POINTS OF "FAITH WORKS ACTIVELY", ARE:

- Active faith is not 'earning' one's way into Heaven.... it <u>is</u> an expression of obedience, <u>because</u> of a <u>genuine love</u> for <u>Christ</u>, <u>and</u> the '<u>vital</u>' "step unto victory." "The only thing that counts is <u>'faith'</u> expressing itself through <u>love</u>." (says, Gal. 5:6)
- 2. Faith is always based on the '<u>unseen results'</u>...of <u>'trusting'</u> on what we <u>believe</u> in... so, we should <u>rejoice</u> and give <u>thanks</u> <u>'before'</u> we <u>see</u> the results.
- 3. <u>If</u>, (by God's grace and <u>guidance</u>), we can truly <u>understand what</u> Christ's Atonement work on the Cross has accomplished for us, we <u>will take</u> our requests in faith<u>(to</u> the foot of the Cross).
- A <u>close union</u> with <u>Christ</u>, comes <u>through</u> an 'obedient faith' in God. <u>Everything</u> in the true Christian life <u>is by</u> '<u>faith</u>', and <u>"by this</u> is <u>God glorified</u>-- <u>by your</u> bearing <u>abundant</u> fruit and thus being true disciples of mine."(John 15:8)
