## DO WE PRAY AND SEE BY FAITH? (DO WE SEE VICTORY OR DEFEAT?)

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One of the most important <u>questions</u> a true Christian could ask themselves, is "Am I seeing in faith?"

The real point we want to consider and the question to confirm in our mind is, <u>how are</u> we actually *seeing* ourselves? How do we really see our <u>condition</u> to be physically? Or how do we see our heart's <u>spiritual</u> condition (in light of circumstances we need to deal with?) <u>Are</u> we following <u>God's</u> plan with our finances and do we see ourselves where God's Word and Promises <u>say</u> we have a Scriptural <u>right</u> to be financially? Are we following <u>God's</u> plan for <u>meeting</u> other family members in God's way, and <u>seeing</u> '<u>peaceful</u> conditions' in our home in the way God's Word tells us that it <u>can</u> be? (Luke 10:6) "And if there is a lover of peace there, your peace shall rest upon it."

Are we seeing by faith the <u>answers</u> to the prayers we have placed before God, or do we only see what <u>the devil</u> wants us to see? Are we <u>passively accepting</u> what he <u>pictures</u> to our mind? If so, and we are seeing <u>defeat</u> everywhere, that <u>is</u> just <u>the way it will be</u> for us. If we are looking in the wrong <u>direction</u> for <u>things</u> we need for ourselves and our family, then everything <u>will be wrong</u>.

What we truly <u>believe</u> in our <u>heart</u> is the <u>issue</u> we are talking about. If we really <u>believe</u> that <u>God</u> will provide the things we <u>need</u> or open the way for us to do the things we wish to do (all <u>within</u> His Will), <u>He will</u> provide for or enable it to be that way. (Prov.10:24), "The wicked man's <u>fears</u> will all come true, and so will the good man's <u>hopes</u>." Also (Prov.23:7) "For <u>as he thinks</u> in his heart, <u>so is he</u>." So, are we <u>seeing</u> in faith? Or are we <u>doubting</u> God's Word? <u>That</u> is the all-important <u>question</u> to ask ourselves.

Apostle Paul told the Corinthians they must <u>examine</u> themselves on this <u>one vital</u> <u>point</u>, (2 Cor.13:5) <u>"Test</u> yourselves to <u>discover</u> whether you are <u>true believers</u>: put your own selves under examination. Or do you not know that Jesus Christ is within you <u>unless</u> you are <u>in</u>sincere?"

When people of the nation of Israel were <u>insincere</u> and were back-sliding from the faith, God questioned the prophet, "Amos, What <u>seest</u> thou?" (Amos 8:2). The prophet could see God's <u>wrath</u> coming on the Israelites, who <u>had been</u> <u>deceived</u> by the <u>devil</u> to *place their trust* in other <u>persons</u> or <u>things</u> instead of in the living <u>God</u>.

They were not seeing themselves where God's Word said they should be, so they were accepting fears from the devil, and were trusting in the 'arm of flesh' to get what they needed. All those other 'places of trust' or false resting places, proved to be Idols to the Israelites, which effectually came between them and their faith in God, and they drew His wrath on themselves.

(Quite <u>opposite</u> <u>to</u> their forefather <u>Abraham</u>, who <u>believed</u> God's words, and so, was able to <u>obey</u> Him. Abraham obeyed God because he believed Him and <u>did not doubt</u>, and he gave up those things he had been trusting in (<u>false resting places</u> as 'Idols') and left his home and earthly possessions (taking only what he and his household could carry). He <u>left</u> while not knowing where his new home would be, only to travel "to a land that I will show you" (as God had told Him. (Gen.12:1).

<u>Abraham</u> <u>continued</u> <u>believing</u> God's words to him when in Canaan "the <u>land</u> that <u>God</u> <u>showed</u>" him, so he was enabled to <u>obey</u> God's instruction, and <u>his faith</u> (and <u>trust</u>) in <u>God</u>, was "counted to him for righteousness" (Gen.15:6). He <u>was</u> indeed *seeing himself* (in faith), the way <u>God said</u> that he <u>should see himself</u> (and the way we should see ourselves). "But the <u>righteous</u> will live by faith. And if he shrinks back, I will <u>not</u> be pleased with him.' But we are not of those who shrink back and are destroyed, but of those who believe and are saved." (Heb.10:38-39)

However, because of the <u>Israelites'</u> *lack* of <u>faith</u>, they also <u>could</u> not <u>obey</u> God's command to <u>'have no idols in their life'</u>. Their <u>disobedience</u> and <u>unfaithfulness</u> (as they resorted to <u>self-efforts</u>) brought on themselves 'the <u>wrath of God</u>' and caused Him to <u>forsake</u> them. That also effectually <u>shut out</u> any <u>understanding</u> of God's <u>Word</u> and hindered His power from working for them. Having <u>lost</u> <u>understanding</u> of God's Word, the <u>Israelites lost</u> <u>all faith in God</u> as well, so He could <u>not</u> help them <u>because</u> of their <u>unbelief</u>.

They were indeed <u>living</u> in fear, <u>striving</u> in the flesh, <u>groping</u> to make ends meet, and using deceitful ways to cheat their customers as brought out (Amos 8:5-6) "<u>When</u> will the Sabbath be ended that we may market wheat?, <u>skimping</u> the measure, <u>boosting</u> the price and <u>cheating</u> with dishonest scales, buying the poor with silver and the needy for a pair of sandals, <u>selling even the sweepings</u> with the wheat."

Then, <u>came</u> the <u>Lord</u>'s <u>wrath</u>, (vs.7), "The LORD hath sworn by the excellency of Jacob, 'Surely I will <u>never forget any of their works</u>." (And vs.11-12) "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord GOD, that I will send a famine in the land, <u>not</u> a famine of <u>bread</u>, nor a thirst for <u>water</u>, but of <u>hearing the Words of the LORD</u>. And they shall wander from sea to sea, and from the north even to the east, they shall run to and fro to seek the <u>Word</u> of the LORD and <u>shall not</u> find it." <u>Because they were using deceit</u>, <u>deception</u>, and <u>dishonest</u> <u>scales</u> to <u>seek</u> <u>riches</u>, instead of <u>trusting on God</u>.

The Israelites' stubborn <u>self-will</u> and <u>unwillingness</u> to <u>repent</u>, eventually led them astray and right <u>out of God's</u> Will. When they lost His <u>Spirit</u>, they also lost all <u>understanding</u> of His <u>Word</u>. God said to the prophet (Isaiah 5:12-13) "but they have <u>no regard</u> for the deeds of the LORD, no <u>respect</u> for the work of his hands. Therefore, my people will go into exile for <u>lack of</u> <u>understanding</u>;" (also Isaiah 6:9-10) He said, "Go and tell this people: 'Be ever-hearing, but <u>never understanding</u>; be ever-seeing, but never <u>perceiving</u>.' Make the heart of this people calloused; make their ears dull and close their eyes."

To lose the Holy Spirit, and so, all <u>understanding of God's Word</u> (which will lead a person to <u>Eternal Life</u>), is a <u>steep price</u> to <u>pay</u> because of <u>our own stubborn self-will</u> to get things via our own plans and efforts, instead of in <u>God's</u> way.

God <u>promises</u> to <u>provide</u> for us, and to be our *Comforter* all <u>seasons</u> of the year. (Heb.13:5) "I will never, never forsake you" (He said). So when we pray for divine healing and <u>comfort</u> of body, or comfortable <u>weather</u>, or <u>comfort</u> and <u>peace</u> in our home, and, <u>then</u> we grumble and complain about those same things that we just prayed for, and we <u>turn to our own</u> <u>plans</u> or <u>means</u> for <u>comfort</u> and <u>peace</u>, instead of <u>claiming God's promise</u> to comfort us, then we are <u>not believing nor seeing in faith</u> (so, what is the use of our praying?

We may <u>ask</u> <u>ourselves</u>, "What seest Thou" (as God asked, Amos 8:2). Are we seeing ourselves in <u>victory</u> or <u>defeat</u>? If we <u>see</u> victory, we will <u>have</u> victory; if we see <u>defeat</u>, we will have <u>defeat</u>, if we see <u>God</u> winning our battle, it will be so. (Again, Prov.23:7) "For <u>as</u> he <u>thinks</u> in <u>his heart</u>, so is he."

Instead of praying for something and then <u>grumbling</u> and <u>complaining</u> about the circumstance we have already <u>prayed</u> for, we should be praying *in faith*, <u>seeing</u> <u>ourselves in</u> <u>victory</u> (not defeat), and <u>claiming</u> our <u>comfort</u> and <u>victory</u> from <u>God</u>, who <u>gives</u> <u>all</u> <u>comfort</u>. <u>When</u> we take our stand of faith on God's promise to <u>comfort</u> us, we have every scriptural right to be comforted <u>by</u> <u>God</u>, instead of <u>relying</u> <u>on our own way</u> or <u>means</u> to provide our comfort. We all <u>can prove it</u> for ourselves.

We want to <u>take heed to</u> the <u>words of</u> <u>God</u>, our <u>Creator</u> (who spoke to us through His Son and the prophets before Him, (Amos 4:13) "He who '<u>forms</u> the mountains', '<u>creates</u> the wind'." And he '<u>controls</u> the rains' (Amos 4:7) "I <u>also withheld rain</u> from you, when the harvest was still three months away. I sent rain on one town but withheld it from another. <u>One field had</u> <u>rain; another had none</u> and dried up."

We should follow apostle Paul's example (2 Cor.1:3) "Heartfelt <u>thanks</u> be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ-the Father who is full of compassion and the God who <u>gives</u> all <u>comfort</u>", (We want to '<u>give thanks</u>' even <u>before</u> <u>we see</u> our <u>deliverance</u>, and in all circumstances and seasons).

God's Word says a certain thing is <u>true</u> after we pray, <u>but Satan's</u> object is to <u>convince</u> <u>us</u> that it <u>is not true</u>. (Prov.4:20-22) "My son, pay <u>attention</u> to what I say; <u>listen</u> <u>closely</u> to my words. Do not let them out of your sight, keep them within your heart; for they are <u>LIFE</u> to those who <u>find</u> them, and <u>health</u> to a man's whole body." (We must see our healing by faith), for as we <u>think</u> in our mind and heart, <u>so will it</u> <u>be.</u> (<u>That</u> is <u>the</u> <u>Truth</u> God <u>wants</u> <u>us</u> <u>to</u> <u>understand</u> from <u>His</u> <u>Word</u>.)

That vitally important '<u>understanding</u> of God's Word' is what the Israelites lost, because of their <u>lack of faith</u>, and <u>not</u> seeing victory for themselves. It led them to trust in the 'arm of flesh' instead of 'trust on God'. They could no longer see themselves where God's Word said they <u>could</u> or <u>would</u> be, if they would just <u>believe</u> Him, so, as result, they turned to <u>their own selfefforts</u> to <u>provide</u> and <u>comfort</u>, and <u>neither could</u> they obey God after they lost His Spirit.

Again, guite a contrast to their forefather Abraham, who believed and obeyed God, and "counted was unto him his faith as righteousness." God did not have to ask Abraham, "What seest thou?", for Abraham believed and saw himself where God's Word said he would be, so he received God's comfort and was inspired to obey Him in everything (even to the point of being willing to sacrifice his son.) God rewarded Abraham for his faithfulness, for he was counted as 'righteous in God's sight' (and he is in Heaven to this day). He received Eternal life!!

<u>God</u> had also shown the Israelite's ancestors many <u>miracles</u>, while they were still in bondage in the land of Egypt. He even <u>parted</u> the Red Sea before their eyes so they could escape the Pharaoh's army, and He brought <u>water</u> from the rocks in the desert to quench their thirst.

But <u>they still would not believe God's</u> promises, so, they could not <u>obey</u> the instructions He gave them through Moses, <u>because</u> they <u>lacked</u> in <u>faith</u>. Instead, they <u>grumbled</u> and <u>complained</u> against Moses in their <u>unbelief</u> (which <u>was really</u> grumbling and <u>complaining against</u> God's <u>Word</u>). It effectively <u>kept</u> that whole generation of Israelites <u>from</u> <u>entering</u> the Promised land of Canaan and <u>from</u> enjoying <u>God's rest</u>.

(Heb.3:16-19), "For who were they that heard, and yet <u>provoked</u> God? Was it not the whole of the people who had come out of Egypt under the leadership of Moses? And with whom was God so greatly grieved for forty years? Was it not with those who had <u>sinned</u>? And to whom did He swear that they should <u>not be admitted</u> to <u>His rest</u>, if it was not to those who were <u>disobedient</u>? And so, we see that it was owing to <u>lack</u> of <u>faith</u> that <u>they could not be admitted</u>."

That is what God told them, when He spoke to them <u>again</u>, through the prophet Isaiah, (many years <u>after</u> their forefathers had wandered through the desert). (Isaiah 42:20), "You have <u>seen</u> many things, but have <u>paid</u> <u>no attention</u>; your <u>ears</u> are open, but you hear nothing."

Then He gave a solemn <u>warning</u> for everyone in generations to follow, (vs.23-24) "Which of you will <u>listen</u> to this or <u>pay</u> close <u>attention</u> in time to come? <u>Who</u> handed Jacob over to become loot, and Israel to the plunderers? Was it not the LORD, <u>against whom</u> <u>we have sinned</u>? For they <u>would not</u> follow his ways; (and) <u>they did not obey his law</u>."

The Israelites, <u>because of their self-will</u> and <u>lack of trust</u> in God, had <u>grieved God</u> and <u>lost</u> the Holy Spirit. So, they also lost the <u>understanding</u> of His <u>Word</u>.

Paul brought out that same principle of Truth (Cor.2:14) "The man <u>without the Spirit</u> <u>does not accept</u> the things that come <u>from</u> the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him, and he cannot <u>understand</u> them, <u>because</u> they are <u>spiritually discerned</u>."

The Israelites lack of <u>understanding</u> led to their <u>unbelief</u> in <u>God's</u> Promises. They disobeyed God and placed their trust in <u>human</u> <u>plans</u> (or idols) instead of depending on the *living God* to <u>comfort</u> and provide for them, and they were <u>unwilling</u> to <u>repent</u>. The <u>prophet</u> <u>Jonah</u> however (after learning the <u>same</u> lesson not to follow the *will of the self-life*), was inspired to <u>repent</u> and to testify, (Jonah 2:8) "Those who cling to <u>worthless</u> idols forfeit the grace that <u>could be theirs</u>. But I, with a song of <u>thanksgiving</u>, will sacrifice to you. What I have <u>vowed</u> I will make <u>good</u>. <u>Salvation</u> comes from the <u>LORD</u>." (After his repenting, Jonah <u>was</u> then <u>seeing in faith</u>.)

Again, that <u>all-important</u> <u>question</u> for <u>every</u> true Christian, "<u>What Seest Thou</u>?"!! Are we <u>seeing in Faith</u>? Or are we in <u>unbelief</u>, seeing things <u>the way the devil wants us to see things</u>, (not seeing our healing from oppression by faith, nor seeing our needs being provided by God, and as a result, turning to <u>our own plans</u> or <u>efforts</u> as the Israelites did on many occasions (which was recorded <u>for us to learn lessons of</u> *faith and trust* <u>from their</u> experiences.)

When we look to someone <u>else</u> or some human <u>plan</u> to provide for us (or our families), we are shutting out the mercy and grace of God, <u>by allowing someone</u> or <u>something</u> to come <u>between</u> us and our <u>place</u> of <u>trust</u> in God. When we turn our trust toward someone <u>else</u> (it could be an <u>employer</u>, a <u>relative</u>, a <u>friend</u>), or some <u>other</u> man-made plan for ourselves and our families, we are (as the late Pastor said), "<u>ignoring</u> what the <u>Blood</u> of <u>Christ</u> <u>provided</u> for us, and <u>throwing</u> <u>God</u>'s <u>overtures</u> <u>of</u> <u>mercy</u> to the winds."

The Israelites were <u>ignoring</u> God's promises given through the prophet (Isaiah 55:1) "<u>Come</u>, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy, and eat! Come, buy wine and milk, <u>without</u> money and <u>without</u> cost."

Those Promises should mean the <u>same</u> to us <u>today</u> and should be as <u>valuable</u> to us as they <u>should have been</u> to those Israelites. Again, it is <u>Satan's</u> business <u>to convince us</u> that God's Promises are <u>not true</u>, <u>but God's Word</u> says they are <u>true when</u> we pray and <u>believe</u> in real faith.

However, the Israelites were <u>not taking</u> a <u>stand on God</u>'s <u>Word</u> given through Moses and the prophets, and they were <u>not believing</u> in His Promises. Rather, they were taking matters in their <u>own</u> hands, <u>instead of waiting on God</u> through <u>believing His Promises</u>.

It is the <u>same</u> with us <u>today</u>; are we SEEING in faith, or have we accepted the <u>devil's</u> lies, and are <u>doubting</u> God's promises and then <u>in fear of not getting</u> what we <u>need</u> or want, do we then <u>turn</u> to our <u>own plans</u> or <u>efforts</u>? (Gal.3:3 admonishes), "Are you so <u>foolish</u>? After <u>beginning with the Spirit</u>, are you now trying to attain your goal by <u>human effort</u>?"

To love and <u>obey</u> Jesus Christ, is to trust and <u>believe</u> in Him and not trust on our own self efforts (or on someone <u>else</u> instead of Him). To <u>believe</u> in <u>His</u> <u>Son</u> is the <u>only</u> <u>requirement</u> God puts on us, to receive His free '<u>gift</u> of <u>salvation'</u>.

The inspired writer to the Hebrews advises us not to resort to human efforts (or man-made plans), rather, he <u>encourages</u> us to <u>be faithful</u> to the very end, (Heb.3:13-14) "On the contrary <u>encourage</u> one another, day after day, so long as Today lasts, so that <u>not one</u> of you may be hardened through the <u>deceitful</u> <u>character</u> of <u>sin</u>. For we have all alike, become <u>sharers</u> with Christ, <u>if</u> we <u>really hold</u> <u>our first</u> <u>confidence</u> firm to the End;"

We can <u>believe</u> 'the Promises' in God's Word and enjoy the <u>same results</u> as the man did whom Jesus spoke to (Matt.8) "Sir," replied the Captain, "I am not a fit person to receive you under my roof: <u>merely say the Word</u>, and my servant <u>will</u> be cured." Jesus said to the Captain (vs 13) "Go, and just as you have believed, so <u>be it for you</u>." And the servant <u>recovered</u> precisely <u>at that time</u>." The man was <u>Seeing in</u> <u>Faith</u> and his <u>prayer</u> was <u>answered</u>. <u>We can</u> <u>all have that same answer to our prayers of</u> <u>faith today</u>.

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Main points of, Are We Seeing in Faith?

1. The message theme is, how are we *seeing* ourselves? Are we believing God's Word and <u>seeing</u> the answer to our prayer, or do we accept what the devil pictures to our mind, and so accept defeat?

2. We are told to <u>test</u> and <u>examine</u> ourselves by asking that most profound question, "Am I a true believer?" (2 Cor. 13:5).

3. "Am I <u>relying</u> on '<u>false</u> places of trust', or am I believing in God's promises to provide for our finances, our health of body, peace in my home, and to <u>be freed from attitudes of</u> the <u>self-life</u>, or <u>self-efforts to control loved ones</u> or <u>coworkers</u>?" 4. If one <u>does not believe</u> <u>God's promises</u>, they then <u>lose understanding of God's Word</u>, and because of one's '<u>lack</u> of <u>faith</u>', they <u>cannot obey</u> His <u>Word</u>. (Isaiah 5:12-13) & (Heb. 3:16-19) is mentioned.

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
