## Our Honesty with God

(Allows Him to Perfect Our Attitude)

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Importance of our being spiritually honest with God is something we cannot overemphasize, because one's unwillingness to repent of that kind of dishonesty can take a person to the Lake of Fire (As John the Baptist warned the Pharisees). However, to realize how spiritually illiterate and helpless we really are, and, having a willingness to be honest and sincere in our attitude toward God, .. allows God to change our attitude and it will bring real deliverance out of our troubles.

To not be willing to see our spiritual condition for what it really is, was the attitude of Scribes and Pharisees in Jesus' time, when John warned them and Jesus denounced them for being hypocritical. If there is ever anything that is needed in our life, it is to be spiritually honest with God (and to live the Truth right), .. because our eternal interests are at stake. (Jesus said Matt. 23:13) "But woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, Hypocrites! For you shut up the kingdom of heaven against men; for you neither go in yourselves, nor do you allow those who are entering to go in. (Vs.15) "Woe to you, Scribes and Pharisees, Hypocrites! For you travel land and sea to win one convert, and when he is won. you make him twice as much a son of hell as vourselves."

It was an opposite case with the Centurion who came to Jesus for the healing of his servant. Jesus said that he was an example of the kind of people who would get to Heaven (with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. Jesus (who knows the hearts of all people) could see that the man had some real spiritual light, and that he would be willing to hear and accept what God had to say to him (through Jesus Christ). God expects us to be willing to believe His message of Life sent

through His Son (that will always point us toward an enduring trusting faith on His Word and the power of Jesus shed Blood). If God sees a willingness in our heart to believe Him, then He will give us that same opportunity to use our power of choice, and to choose to believe His Promises and to receive our deliverance from the troubles we face.

The Centurion came to Jesus (Matt.8:6-8) and said, "Lord, my servant is lying at home paralyzed, dreadfully tormented."

And Jesus said to him, "I will come and heal him."

The Centurion answered and said, "Lord, I am not worthy that You should come under my roof. But only speak a word, and my servant will be healed." (Vs.9) "For I also am a man under authority, having soldiers under me. And I say to this one, 'Go,' and he goes; and to another, 'Come,' and he comes; and to my servant, 'Do this,' and he does it." (He meant, I am an important man with a lot of authority in the country, have soldiers under me, and when I tell one of them to do this or that, he does it.) But "Lord, ... I am not worthy that You should come under my roof. But only speak a word, and my servant will be healed."

He honestly <u>acknowledged</u> his <u>own</u> helpless <u>spiritual</u> <u>condition</u>, humbling himself, and placing himself where he belonged in God's sight (and, even though a man of authority <u>humanly speaking</u>, he was not good enough for Jesus Christ to come under his roof). He considered Jesus Christ so great and so worthy of his trust, that he would <u>rather</u> have <u>Jesus' Word</u> that his servant was healed <u>(than to see</u> Jesus Christ heal him before his eyes).

That is the <u>Scriptural position</u> for <u>everyone</u> to <u>take</u>, and Jesus marveled at that, saying to His <u>followers</u>, (Matt.8:10-13) "Assuredly, I say to you, I have not found such <u>great faith</u> (not even in Israel!) "And I say to you that many will come from east and west, and sit down with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven. "But the sons of the kingdom will be cast out into outer darkness. There will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

Jesus was <u>laying down</u> the <u>qualifications</u> for <u>getting to Heaven</u>, <u>which is</u> to <u>take God at His Word</u> and to <u>act in faith</u> on it, without a particle of sight or feeling of being delivered. (James 2:20 warns) "But <u>do you want to know</u>, O foolish man, that faith without works is dead? Was not

Abraham our father justified by works when he offered Isaac his son on the altar? Do you see that <u>faith</u> <u>was</u> working <u>together</u> <u>with</u> his <u>works</u>, and <u>by</u> works (<u>actions</u>) <u>faith</u> was <u>made</u> <u>perfect</u>?"

(Getting back to the centurion) Jesus then said to him(vs.13) "Go your way; and as you have believed, so let it be done for you. And his servant was healed that same hour."

Job's case can be controversial in the Christian world. However, Scriptures reveal there was just one problem with that man (the late Pastor said), that <u>is</u>, <u>Job</u> was filled with spiritual darkness and self-righteousness. He had wonderful outward religion (he was honest, charitable, an upright citizen, and no doubt prayed to God and <u>tried</u> to trust and serve Him). But it was all done in his own strength (an outward religion that would have landed him in the Lake of Fire, but for God's mercy to deal with Job and repentance inspire from his righteousness).[There is no merit in our service, Jesus said.

Many people think that if they are honest, sincere, and live up to the light they have, they will get to Heaven. (But that is <u>not</u> the case). God <u>has</u> just <u>one plan</u> in the Bible for <u>Eternal</u> <u>Life</u>, which is that we are to confess and forsake sins and be born again, make a new start with a sincere surrender to God of the self-will in our life, be filled with the Holy Spirit and grow spiritually. That is what will enable us to obey God's Word in the New Testament, in every detail of our life. The most important thing is that is to be done in God's strength and guidance (not ours). That is what Job had to be taught by God (to save him from eternity in the Lake of Fire instead of Heaven (the only other place for our soul to go to.) God wants to teach that to us just the same as He (in His mercy) taught Job. Through that "growth in holiness apart from which no one will see the Lord."

Job had been trying to please God by doing the best he could (as a <u>professed believer</u>), but without having any real knowledge of God. [There are only two classes of people in this world, <u>unbelievers</u> (or <u>professed true believers</u>), but God is waiting for a person to give Him an opportunity, for He wants to <u>turn</u> every <u>professed</u> believer <u>into</u> a <u>true believer</u> (teach them true knowledge of Himself as He taught Job).

The average person who reads the book of Job would read the first verse and settle it in their mind that he was a perfectly righteous man, (that he had real spiritual light and was a sincere Christian). But right understanding of that book (considering it from a spiritual standpoint), would prove that Job was self-righteous (and did not understand the real character of God). In reality, he was in spiritual darkness and headed toward the Lake of Fire (except for God's mercy to bring him to repentance). Job did not realize his own spiritual condition, instead, he was blinded by outward religion, which makes it harder for him (or anyone else) to be brought to repentance, (than if he were an outright sinner), because he 'thought he was righteous and on his way to Heaven.'

(Job 1:1 says) "There was a man in the land of Uz, whose name was Job; and that man was perfect and upright, and one that <u>feared</u> God, and <u>turned</u> <u>away</u> <u>from</u> <u>evil</u>." (That could be said in different words; "There was an honest man in the land of Uz by the name of Job, who was doing his level best to serve God and to live a good Christian life, .. outwardly. That was all true, yet if he was filled with 'spiritual darkness' (ignorant of God's true character) depending on self-efforts to get things that he needed (and wanted) in life (instead of trusting on <u>God</u> for those things), ...and, depending on his self-righteousness to take him to Heaven (instead of by the indwelling Holy Spirit and the grace of God), .. then he would be worse off with regard to being brought to repentance (than an open sinner would be). That is because he would not realize that he still had the self-life controlling his heart (and thinking that he was on the path to Heaven).

Thirty-one chapters of the book of Job reveal how he tried to justify himself and his self-righteousness. (Job 32:1 says) "So these three men ceased to answer Job, because he was righteous in his own eyes." (God made Job's true spiritual condition clear in that verse).

Job did not know his actual true <u>spiritual</u> <u>condition</u>, and God (in His great mercy) <u>had to</u> <u>reveal</u> that <u>to him</u>. <u>We</u> never know <u>where we are</u> in that way <u>until</u> our nest (comfort zone) is shaken up. When Job had everything going his way (a clear sky with calm weather (spiritually speaking), he <u>seemed</u> to be a wonderful Christian <u>on his way</u>

to <u>Heaven</u> (and was convinced that his family members were going there as well).

However, since he was <u>not</u> in <u>position</u> to <u>trust God</u> for <u>protection</u> (and <u>not knowing</u> the <u>true</u> character of <u>God</u>), that permitted <u>Satan</u> to bring <u>more desperate</u> (and serious things) upon him (probably more than we could have endured). <u>First</u> of all, his children (<u>unprepared for eternity</u>), were killed in a <u>cyclone sent by Satan</u>. <u>Secondly, his property was swept away by a violent wind from Satan (prince of powers of the air) (Ephes.2:2). Then he lost all his friends and soon lost his health. <u>But that is when his true inner character came to light</u>.</u>

Job did not really know God, and so, was spiritually dishonest before God. We must remember, however, that God did not bring those calamities on Job (neither did He allow them to come as punishment). The calamities came as the result of Job going his own way and shutting God out of his life. Satan was the one who actually put those things on Job, .. (he brought the cyclone which destroyed his property and killed his children). (Job 2:7 says), "Satan then went out from the presence of the Lord and struck Job with painful boils from the sole of his foot to the crown of his head."

Job's three friends came to console him, and he began to tell them what an outwardly good and upright man he had been all his life, and how terrible it was that he was allowed to be afflicted (and for no reason on his part). In reality, what he was saying to his friends was, I am all right and God is wrong to allow the loss of my children, my property, and my health, (since I have been trying in every way I know how to be outwardly good and upright).

That is how Job summed up his life (and put the blame on God for his troubles). It may have sounded good from a human standpoint, but from a divine standpoint it was all wrong. Job's troubles were the outcome of his deceitful actions (and his devil-controlled nature) (which would have taken him to the Lake of Fire) except for God's mercy in dealing with him, and giving him opportunity to repent of unfaithfulness (and lack of surrender) to do God's will in his life.

Job's three friends had half-heartedly tried to convince him that <u>maybe</u> God was right, (and, that Job <u>must be wrong</u> somewhere). <u>But Job</u>

soon convinced them, that he (Job) was right (and that God was wrong to allow him to be afflicted). (We want to take notice of the cause of Job's troubles;) .. dishonesty, spiritual darkness, and, seeing things opposite to what they really due to his dependance on selfwere. righteousness (which amounted to unbelief on God).(2 Cor.4:3-4) "If, however, the meaning of our Good News has been <u>veiled</u>, the veil has been on the hearts of those who are on the way to perdition, in whom the 'god of this present age'(Satan), has blinded their unbelieving minds, so as to shut out the sunshine of the Good News of the glory of the Christ." (Those causes of Job's troubles had allowed Satan to rob him of everything he had, and, almost cost him his life (while still yet unprepared for eternity).

Elihu (a man with real 'spiritual light') spoke up and told Job and his friends just where he stood in relation to God, (and how he should have a changed heart attitude, so God could save him from his own self-righteousness). (Job 36:7-12) "He (God) does not withdraw His eyes from the righteous; But they are on the throne with kings, For He has seated them forever, And they are exalted. And if they are bound in fetters, Held in the cords of affliction, Then He tells them their work, and their transgression, that they have acted defiantly. He also opens their ear to instruction, And commands that they turn from iniquity. If they obey and serve Him, They shall spend their days in prosperity, And their years in pleasures. But if they do not obey, They shall perish by the sword, And they shall die without knowledge."

Elihu did not mince any words with Job. He told him straight out where he stood (and where he was headed) if he didn't repent and surrender to obey and trust God in his life. Job had purchased a 'one-way ticket' to the Lake of Fire, and Elihu knew that if he sympathized with Job, he was (in reality), sympathizing with the devil. [We want to make the road to hell as difficult as possible (for loved ones who are on that wrong pathway to destruction of their soul). If we sympathize with them, we are only condoning their wrong actions (or lack of faith) (delaying any true repentance on their part) (and would be responsible for putting them that much closer to the Lake of Fire). All the while, God wants

them to <u>realize what the consequences will be</u> (for their sinful actions), and for <u>them</u> to make a <u>sincere repentance</u>, so that <u>He</u> can <u>save</u> their <u>soul</u> for Eternity.]

Elihu <u>assured Job</u> that <u>God does not withdraw His eyes</u> from a <u>repentant</u> and <u>righteous</u> person, but that He <u>uses trials</u> to <u>point out their transgressions</u> (and of how they have acted defiantly), ..so that <u>if</u> they will obey His <u>commands</u> (and <u>turn from iniquity</u> to <u>obey</u> and <u>serve Him</u>), .. then they shall "spend their days in <u>prosperity</u> and their years in <u>pleasures</u>."

Elihu then <u>solemnly</u> <u>warned</u> him (Job 36:17-18) "<u>But you</u> are filled with the judgment <u>due</u> the <u>wicked</u>; Judgment and justice <u>take hold of you</u>. Because there <u>is wrath</u>, <u>beware lest He</u> take you away <u>with one blow</u>; For(even) a large ransom would <u>not help you avoid it.</u>"

(In other words) 'Job, you need to be <u>very careful</u>, for your life on earth(and your eternity) <u>hinges</u> by 'just a <u>thread'</u>, and if you <u>fail</u> to <u>see things right</u> (and <u>fail</u> to <u>humble yourself</u>), make changes, and get victory from God, you <u>will go to</u> a <u>place where</u> a <u>great ransom could not deliver you</u>.'(Elihu did not sympathize about Job's mistakes, but he wanted to make the road to hell as <u>difficult</u> as <u>possible</u> for Job), .. (out of a <u>divine love for Job</u>).

Then God spoke the real Truth to Job (as He will also do for us, to save us from our sins). God used the purest of essential sarcasm to deal with Job. "Now prepare yourself like a man." (God said) "I will question you, and you shall answer Me. "Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth? Tell Me, if you have understanding." (Job 38: 3-4). (He meant, if I am so unreasonable, and you are so wise and intelligent, how could I have ever created the universe (sun, moon, stars, earth, animals, and human beings) without you being there to tell me how to do it?"

Job began to shrink before God, who then gave a long list of questions to enable Job to realize how great God is, (and by what infinite wisdom and power He created great things). Job threw his hands up, told God he was convinced he had been wrong, and that God was perfectly right. (Job 42:1-2) "Then Job answered the Lord and said: "I know that You can do everything, And that no purpose of Yours can be withheld from

You." (Vs 5-6) "I have <u>heard of You</u> by the hearing of the ear, But <u>now my eye sees You</u>. Therefore, I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes."

That was a far different attitude (than what Job had taken at first). If he had taken that humble and repentant attitude to begin with, (and had been spiritually honest with God to start with), Job would not have had all the troubles he had to go through to bring him to repentance (and to be saved from destruction).

If being spiritually honest with God would take a man from the gates of the Pit, to the gates of Paradise (as it did for the thief on the Cross), and, if it would deliver a man from an ash heap, covered with sores, and give him twice as much blessing as before (as God did for Job),... it certainly would indeed be wise for us to listen (with humility and open-mindedness) to everything God has to say in His Word to us. We should be willing to receive God's real Truth (and to walk in the light of it.)

People will say, 'I don't understand why I am oppressed' (and I do not get my victories). 'There's one reason for that (the Pastor said), .. "spiritual darkness", and not being willing to humble ourselves and be honest with God (rather than justify ourselves).

When we get the right combination of justifying God (and, blaming ourselves for our troubles, instead of blaming God), it does not matter what trouble we would be in, God will bring us out as "more than conquerors", just as He did for Job.



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
